Dear Madam Administrator:

We are writing to invite you or your designee to testify before the Subcommittee on Contracting Oversight at a hearing entitled, "Small Business Contracts: How Oversight Failures and Regulatory Loopholes Allow Large Businesses to Get and Keep Small Business Contracts." The hearing will be held on Tuesday, July 26, 2011 at 10:00 A.M. in Room SD-342 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building.

Since 2005, the Inspector General of the Small Business Administration (SBA) has listed as one of the agency's top management challenges the fact that large firms are obtaining small business contracts and agencies are counting contracts performed by large businesses toward their small business goals. According to the Inspector General, many contract awards recorded as going to small businesses are actually performed by large businesses.<sup>1</sup>

The purpose of the hearing is to examine the ways in which large businesses are obtaining and performing small business contracts. The hearing will also assess the steps taken by the SBA to improve oversight and the reasons why the SBA and other agencies have failed to adequately implement the Inspector General's recommendations. The hearing will also examine what legislative and regulatory steps may be necessary to address these issues.

Your testimony should address the ways large businesses can obtain and perform small business contracts and the steps taken by SBA to implement recommendations by the SBA Inspector General. In addition, your testimony should address recent concerns raised about how large businesses are counted as small businesses in the annual small business scorecard, how SBA plans to eliminate these discrepancies, and the systems and processes contracting officers and SBA use to verify a small business's size status.

To assist the Subcommittee in preparing for the hearing, we request that you provide the Subcommittee staff with a briefing on how SBA classifies a small business, the systems and processes contracting officers and SBA use to verify a small business's size status, how SBA calculates the annual small business scorecard, and the quality assurance procedures SBA uses to ensure the scorecard's

accuracy. We request that you provide this briefing as soon as possible, but in no case later than **July 19**, **2011**.

We request that you summarize your testimony in 5 minutes, although a longer written statement may be submitted for the official record. This will allow adequate time for you to engage in questions and answers with members of the Subcommittee. Subcommittee rules require that your testimony be submitted by no later than 10:00 A.M. on Friday, July 22, 2011. Please send official correspondence relating to this request and invitation, including an electronic copy of your written statement and a brief one page biography, to Subcommittee Clerk, Kelsey Stroud, at Kelsey Stroud@hsgac.senate.gov.

The jurisdiction of the Subcommittee on Contracting Oversight is set forth in Senate Rule XXV clause 1(k); Senate Resolution 445 section 101 (108<sup>th</sup> Congress); and Senate Resolution 73 (111<sup>th</sup> Congress).
