## 3 "SEC. 416. PROTECTION AGAINST POTENTIAL SYNTHETIC 4 OPIOID EXPOSURE.

5 "(a) IN GENERAL.—The Commissioner of U.S. Customs and Border Protection shall issue a policy that speci-6 7 fies effective protocols and procedures for the safe han-8 dling of potential synthetic opioids, including fentanyl, by 9 U.S. Customs and Border Protection officers, agents, 10 other personnel, and canines, and to reduce the risk of injury or death resulting from accidental exposure and en-11 12 hance post-exposure management.

13 "(b) TRAINING.—

"(1) IN GENERAL.—Together with the issuance
of the policy described in subsection (a), the Commissioner of U.S. Customs and Border Protection
shall require mandatory and recurrent training on
the following:

"(A) The potential risk of opioid exposure
and safe handling procedures for potential synthetic opioids, including precautionary measures
such as the use of personal protective equipment during such handling.

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"(B) How to access and administer opioid
 receptor antagonists, including naloxone, post exposure to potential synthetic opioids.

4 "(2) INTEGRATION.—The training described in 5 paragraph (1) may be integrated into existing train-6 ing under section 411(l) for U.S. Customs and Bor-7 der Protection officers, agents, and other personnel. "(e) PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT 8 AND 9 OPIOID RECEPTOR ANTAGONISTS.—Together with the 10 issuance of the policy described in subsection (a), the 11 Commissioner of U.S. Customs and Border Protection 12 shall ensure the availability of personal protective equip-13 ment and opioid receptor antagonists, including naloxone, to all U.S. Customs and Border Protection officers, 14 15 agents, other personnel, and canines at risk of accidental exposure to synthetic opioids. 16

17 "(d) OVERSIGHT.—To ensure effectiveness of the pol18 icy described in subsection (a)—

"(1) the Commissioner of U.S. Customs and
Border Protection shall regularly monitor the efficacy of the implementation of such policy and adjust
protocols and procedures, as necessary; and

23 "(2) the Inspector General of the Department24 shall audit compliance with the requirements of this

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section not less than once during the 3-year period
 after the date of the enactment of this section.".
