HSGAC Majority : Good morning. This is a transcribed
interview of Witness , being conducted by the
Senate Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental
Affairs and the Senate Permanent Subcommittee on
Investigations.

7 This interview was requested by Chairman Gary Peters 8 and Ranking Member Rand Paul, as well as Subcommittee Chair 9 Richard Blumenthal and Ranking Member Ron Johnson, as part 10 of the Committee's investigation of the July 13, 2024, 11 assassination attempt on former President Trump, and the 12 U.S. Secret Service planning and security related to the 13 Butler rally on July 13, 2024.

On July 25, 2024, Chairmen Peters and Blumenthal, and Ranking Members Paul and Johnson requested voluntary transcribed interviews with U.S. Secret Service personnel, and again, on September 11, 2024, requested additional transcribed interviews, including of <u>Witness</u>.

19 We will provide introductions today of our four 20 offices who are conducting this interview and explain how 21 we will proceed. And I will begin by introducing myself, 22 HSGAC Majority . I am Chief Counsel and Chief Investigative 23 Counsel for Chairman Gary Peters on the full committee. Ι 24 am joined here today by my colleagues, HSGAC Majority 25 Senior Investigator, and HSGAC Majority, Senior Investigative

1 Counsel. And I will turn it over to our colleagues. 2 HSGAC Minority : Good morning. My name is HSGAC Minority HSGAC Minori for HSGAC minority. I'm joined by HSGAC Minority 3 PSI Majority : And I'm PSI Majority , Counsel for PSI 4 5 majority. 6 PSI Minority : Good morning. I'm PSI Minority with 7 Senator Johnson's office as Staff Director. I'm joined by my colleagues, PSI Minority, Chief Counsel, and PSI Minority 8 9 PSI Minority, Deputy Staff Director for Senator Johnson. HSGAC Majority : And Witness 10 , I'd now ask you to introduce yourself and your title, and then your counsel. 11 12 Witness , Special Agent, Witness : I'm 13 U.S. Secret Service. My personal attorney is Witness Counsel . Witness Counsel: My name is Witness Counsel. I am the private 14 15 counsel to the Federal Law Enforcement Officers 16 Association. I'm here in my representative capacity 17 virtually. Agency Counsel 18 I'm I'm from the Agency Counsel 19 Office of Chief Counsel, Secret Service. 20 Agency Counsel from Department Agency Counsel I'm 21 of Homeland Security Office of General Counsel. 22 HSGAC Majority : During today's interview we'll do our best 23 to limit the number of people speaking at once and try and 24 go in order, so you can understand the questions being 25 asked and people asking the questions. That said, from



time to time there may be follow-up to a question we just asked you. If any of the questions we're asking or the follow-up are confusing, please ask us to clarify the question and we'll be happy to do so.

5 Today the reporter is going to create a verbatim 6 record of what we discuss. With that in mind, as I'm sure 7 you're familiar, please respond verbally, because the 8 reporter cannot properly record any nonverbal responses. 9 Do you understand?

11 This interview is being conducted in an HSGAC Majority 12 unclassified setting, so if questions we ask call for 13 information you know to be classified or to implicate 14 classified information, we would ask that you state the 15 reason you cannot answer. And once you have clarified, to 16 the extent possible, please respond with as much 17 unclassified information as you can to be responsive to the 18 question, and if need be we can enter a classified session 19 and can arrange for that at a later date. Do you 20 understand?

- Witness : I understand.

HSGAC Majority: It is the Committee's practice to honor valid common law privilege claims and to accommodate witnesses when those claims are made in good faith and accompanied by a sufficient explanation, so that the



Committees can evaluate the claim. When deciding whether to honor these privileges, the Committee will weigh its need for the information against any legitimate basis for withholding it. The interview today is occurring without prejudice to any future discussions the Committee may seek, and we reserve the right to request your participation at a future date if need be.

8 If you have to take a break, other than the breaks we 9 plan to take -- we will break on the hour, or after an hour 10 session each -- just let us know and we will be happy to do 11 so, and we can accommodate you.

12 If you have any questions about what we are asking we 13 are happy to clarify. Just ask us to do so. And when you 14 respond you are required to answer questions truthfully. 15 Do you understand?

- Witness : I understand.

HSGAC Majority: This also applies to questions posed by congressional staff in an interview, including today's interview. And specifically 18 USC Section 1001 makes it a crime to make any materially false, fictitious, or fraudulent statements or representations in the course of a congressional investigation. This statute applies to your statements in this interview. Do you understand?

4 Witness : I understand.

25 HSGAC Majority : Is there any reason that you would not be



1 able to provide truthful answers today?

2 Witness

: No.

HSGAC Majority: We would also ask that you not speak about what we discuss in this interview with anyone outside of who is in the room today, in order to preserve the integrity of our investigation. We will provide counsel with a copy of this transcript and an errata in order to make corrections, or access to the transcript.

9 Do you have any questions before we begin?

10 Witness

Witness : No, sir.

Just very quickly, the Secret Service 11 Agency Counsel : 12 and the Department of Homeland Security have made available to the Committee, consistent with requests from the 13 14 Chairman, information and records that would not be 15 publicly released. This includes information and records 16 covered under the Privacy Act, personnel and other personal privacy information, for official use only, intelligence 17 18 and law enforcement sensitive records, and raw intelligence 19 information.

20 While the Secret Service and the Department have made 21 this information and records available to the Committee, we 22 continue to assert that such information and any discussion 23 of such information is not intended for public disclosure. 24 The Secret Service and the Department are not waiving 25 any protections, and for the purposes of administrative



efficiency and to promote constructive dialogue during the transcribed interview, are making these assertions at the outset of the transcribed interview to preserve all assertions of protection from the public release or disclosure of information or records used or discussed during the transcribed interview.

7 The transcript and any attachments are protected from 8 dissemination to the same extent as the documents and 9 information that they are based on. Please consult with 10 the Secret Service and the Department prior to any public 11 release or disclosure. The Secret Service and the 12 Department have not consented to, and were assured that 13 there would not be any audio recordings of this interview. 14 The agencies understand that the interview will be 15 transcribed by the court reporter, and that the court 16 reporter may use a recording for the purpose of 17 transcription.

18 Just for the record, I am reiterating that HSGAC Majority 19 [unclear] transcribed interviews that the Committee will be 20 bound solely by Senate and Committee rules. We will adhere to them. And in addition, as is the Committee's practice, 21 22 in advance of any publication of nonpublic information, 23 including information we learn in today's interview, it is 24 our practice to provide individuals who provided that 25 information or agencies and their counsel excerpts in



advance of publication so that they may provide any factual corrections. That would be our intention here, as well. As you know, we have made one public interim report, and we intend to make additional publications, and we will adhere to best practice.

6 With respect to the transcript itself, the 7 Committee retains the transcript as a record. It is the 8 property of the Committee, and as discussed we will provide 9 counsels with an opportunity to review and correct.

10 There will be an audio recording. That audio 11 recording, to my understanding, is only to be used for the 12 basis of creating the transcript itself. And I just ask 13 that our offices all acknowledge we will rely on the 14 transcript itself as the basis for the record for this 15 interview. Thank you.

And just for the record, the offices have all agreed. And with that I would like to begin. We would just ask, Witness, if you could begin by stating your background with the Secret Service, when you began, any training you've had, and lead us up to the status that you had as of July 13th and your responsibilities on that date.

Witness : Okay. So I started with the Secret Service October of 2022. And I went through the Academy and graduated in September 2023. So I've only been in the field now just over a year. Leading up to the event I was



at NATO, for the NATO Summit, and then [unclear] the July
 13th event for Trump, and was assigned as a Counter Sniper
 Response Agent for that event.





1 if you hear the full response.

2 [Pause.]

3 HSGAC Majority : HSGAC Majority . I'm a [inaudible]. You
4 said you started with the Secret Service in October of '22
5 and graduated in [inaudible]. Did you start with the
6 uniformed division?

7

Witness : No.

8 HSGAC Majority : So you've been a special agent since you
9 graduated the Academy in September of 2023?

10 Witness : Yes.

HSGAC Majority : And the folks who are virtual here [inaudible].

Agency Counsel : I believe you were addressing us, and your mic now seems to be cutting out. All I heard was "for the folks who are virtual."

HSGAC Majority: We're going to move to another location and pick it up, and that should solve the problem.

18 [Pause.]

HSGAC Majority : We're back on the record. Thank you,
Special Agent Witness . So you were saying you were never
in the uniformed division. You've been a special agent
since September of '23. Is that right?

23 Witness : Correct.

24 HSGAC Majority : Are you assigned to a particular field

25 office?



1 Witness : Oklahoma City Field Office. 2 HSGAC Majority : Regarding this rally in Butler on July 3 13th, did you take any notes, either handwritten or 4 electronically, either before, during, or after, about that 5 event? б Witness : I have just what I did online, I 7 submitted it in our SharePoint. 8 HSGAC Majority : Sorry. You had what? Just a timeline of what the events 9 : Witness 10 went on, for the interview purpose. 11 Did you make that available to the HSGAC Majority 12 Secret Service? 13 Witness Yes. : 14 HSGAC Majority : Okay. I would request Secret Service 15 counsel, if we haven't received that already, that we would 16 request that document. Do you know if that's been provided to the Committee? 17 18 Agency Counsel : I will have to double check. My 19 understanding was that everything had been provided, but I 20 will, as usual, double check. 21 HSGAC Majority Thank you. Regarding your assignment to 22 this rally on July 13th, when were you told you'd be 23 assigned? I think you said July 11th -- is that right? 24 : Correct. Witness 25 Is that the same time you were told that HSGAC Majority



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Witness : I did not find out until July 12th.
HSGAC Majority : Who told you you'd be the CS response
agent?

5 Witness : I believe it was a site agent that 6 sent out the posting assignments. I don't remember her 7 name offhand.

8 HSGAC Majority : Can you explain why you were selected to staff this event if you were in the Oklahoma City office? 9 10 Witness : So for any agent in Secret Service we 11 get assigned to anywhere in the U.S. for any assignment. 12 It's just what they need whatever particular event. HSGAC Majority : Are you aware of any other agents who 13 14 were assigned to this event from your field office? 15 Witness : Not my field office, no.

16 HSGAC Majority: Okay. And do you know why you were
17 selected to be a CS response agent for this event?

18 Witness : There's no particular region for being 19 selected as CS Response. I guess they go down the list of 20 positions that they need for that particular event and then 21 they'll just put the names in there of agents that are 22 selected.

HSGAC Majority: We're passing a document to you. It's
been marked Exhibit 1.

25 Witness : Okay.







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Witness

: USSS Agent .

HSGAC Majority: So this email on July 10, saying, "FYI, 2 3 I will be submitting your name for this assignment. 4 Sorry." You don't recall receiving that? 5 : I'm reading further now. Yes, I do Witness 6 remember getting that. HSGAC Majority : Okay. So this first email at the top, 7 in response to that email about side note, "I need to make 8 9 a correction to my LA voucher." Did you send that email in 10 response to the one below it? 11 Yes. I was on an assignment prior to Witness : 12 this assignment. HSGAC Majority : Understood. Do you recall who sent you 13 14 this email, where it says, "FYI, I will be submitting your 15 name for this assignment"? 16 : Like I said, it was either A/ASAC Witness . I want to say it was A/ASAC , our 17 or A/ASAC 18 now acting ASAC. 19 HSGAC Majority : Do you know why he said, "Sorry?" 20 Because we'd been traveling back to : Witness 21 back on trips, so he didn't want to -- he felt bad having 22 to quick roll me to another trip. 23 HSGAC Majority: Understood. Can you walk us through how 24 the CS response role works? So first, how many times had



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you worked as a CS response agent before the Butler rally?

1 to events where counter snipers are provided?

2 : Yes, from my understanding. Witness 3 HSGAC Majority : Is it your understanding that the Butler 4 rally on July 13th was the first time Secret Service sent 5 counter snipers to former President Trump's events? 6 Witness : I'm unaware of that. 7 HSGAC Majority: When you were in the field, at an event as a CS response agent, is there a hierarchy of who you 8 9 report to? Do you report to the CS lead? 10 : So the CS lead is supposed to reach Witness 11 out to me if there's any type of event. So yes, to answer 12 that question. 13 HSGAC Majority : So is it only the CS lead's authority to 14 deploy you or to dispatch you to respond to something at an 15 event, or can other Secret Service personnel direct you? 16 : Other Secret Service personnel, so Witness 17 like the Security Room or Command Post, whichever term you 18 want to use for it. They can reach out to you, as well. 19 HSGAC Majority : But it is it generally supposed to be an 20 asset of the counter snipers? In other words, the counter 21 sniper team, for lack of a better word, owns the asset of a 22 CS response agent to be used for their purposes, or is it 23 really Secret Service writ large can use this asset at 24 these events?

: So from my understanding, CS response

1 can have multiple duties at that event. However, like I
2 said, this was my first time doing CS response, so I'm
3 unaware of their normal protocol. However, it is my
4 understanding that, yes, the Security Room personnel are
5 able to deploy us as they see fit during the event.

HSGAC Majority: Understood. Are you familiar with the
Protective Intelligence, or PI, Agent role?

8 Witness : Yes.

9 HSGAC Majority: What's your understanding of that role?
10 Witness : Their purpose, from my understanding,
11 is to respond to anyone that is deemed suspicious or
12 otherwise showing suspicious behavior.

HSGAC Majority: Do you know if a PI agent receives particular training?

15 Witness : Not as a post-stander. They do have 16 Protective Intelligence Division. They go through 17 something completely separate. But as a post-stander, not 18 from my understanding, no.





you're looking for, well, PI looks for more of a suspicious individual, and you look for more of a threat. Generally a threat can, at times, become -- or, sorry, a suspicious person can, in certain scenarios, become a threat, as we saw in this event. However, that would be their connection there. They can help each other find said suspicious person or whatever it may be.

8 HSGAC Majority : Is it your understanding that a CS 9 response agent and PI agent are in close proximity together 10 during events?

11 Witness : It is not my understanding that that 12 is a requirement, no.

HSGAC Majority: Okay. Regarding the Butler rally on July 13th, did you have any involvement in planning for the rally?

16 Witness : No.

HSGAC Majority : Did you rely on any information ahead of the rally to prepare?

Witness : Just the Assignment Log I would get.
That and a brief on the morning of.

21 HSGAC Majority : Did you receive any other documentation
22 ahead of the rally?

23 Witness : I'd have to look at my email, but I'm 24 pretty sure we received a good bit of documents via

25 digital.



1 HSGAC Majority : Did you attend or give any briefings --2 : We attended -- oh --Witness 3 HSGAC Majority : -- sorry, specific to the rally. 4 Witness : Yes. On the day of the event, July 5 13th, in the morning, we got a brief. б **HSGAC Majority:** Do you recall what time that was? 7 : Offhand I would say between 9 and 10 Witness o'clock in the morning. 8 9 HSGAC Majority : Was that just Secret Service personnel 10 at that briefing? 11 Secret Service and HSI. Witness : 12 Did you survey the site at all or do any HSGAC Maiority 13 kind of walkthrough before the event began? 14 Witness : Yes. 15 HSGAC Majority : What did you do? 16 : So the site agent and lead, they would Witness 17 essentially do a roll call and make sure they have 18 everybody on that list that were assigned to their 19 particular post-standing positions. The site agent took 20 half the group and the lead took the other half of the 21 group to kind of show them where their positions were going 22 to be and discuss further what the responsibilities are at 23 each post. 24 HSGAC Majority : Did you conduct any kind of threat 25 assessment of the grounds or buildings?

2 HSGAC Majority : The identified vulnerabilities including
3 the water tower.

4 Witness : Oh no, there was no document for that. 5 That was just a visual on my own.

HSGAC Majority: Are there any other documents or
information that would've been helpful to receive ahead of
the rally, that you expected to receive?

9 Witness : No. I received a CS packet, but 10 otherwise I was, for that particular position, that's 11 usually what you would get.

HSGAC Majority: Had you been to Butler before this rally?

14 Witness : No.

HSGAC Majority: And in terms of your responsibility as a CS response agent, did you have a specific area of

17 responsibility?

18 Witness : Just the event itself. I mean, can

19 you specify?









1 of the perimeter at the Butler rally?

2	Witness : Inner perimeter was anything where the
3	immediate area was, like the stage up to the magnetometers.
4	And then the middle perimeter was essentially the field
5	between the crowd and the AGR building, and the outer
6	perimeter would be beyond the AGR building, circling I
7	apologize, I don't remember the street names, but front and
8	back street of the event would be the outer perimeter,
9	essentially border.
10	HSGAC Majority : And to clarify, the middle perimeter
11	that you described, between the fence and AGR, that was
12	outside the secure magnetometer area. Is that right?
13	Witness : You're discussing the one at 3
14	o'clock? So yes, that was outside the mags, blocked off by
15	a fence.
16	HSGAC Majority : Right. Understood. Did you have any
17	concerns about the perimeter?
18	Witness : Not at the time, no.
19	HSGAC Majority : Not at the time. Have you since raised
20	concerns or had concerns about the perimeter?
21	Witness : I do now, yes.
22	HSGAC Majority: And what are they?
23	Witness : Lack of manning, personnel, in the
24	area.
25	HSGAC Majority : Can you expound on that? So what did

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2 : It wasn't until shots fired did I Witness 3 realize there wasn't enough local -- so typically you'll 4 have more locals on the outer and middle perimeter, more so 5 the outer perimeter, to help deal with crowds and traffic. 6 Now this is all from my perspective. I don't know if there 7 were more individuals there or not prior to that. However, when I arrived at the building there was not the amount of 8 9 people that I expected there to be, as far as law 10 enforcement. HSGAC Majority : And when you say when you arrived at the 11 12 building, you mean after shots fired? 13 Yes. Witness : 14 HSGAC Majority : Did anyone else have any concerns, that 15 you were aware of, before the rally about the perimeter? 16 : Only the same thing as the water Witness 17 tower. 18 And regarding the AGR building, same HSGAC Majority 19 question. Did you have any concerns or identify any 20 vulnerabilities about the AGR building before the rally? 21 Witness : No. It was my understanding that 22 there was a sniper team on the roof of the AGR building, so 23 that was concern was removed once I was told that. 24 HSGAC Majority Who told you that? 25 The CS lead. Witness :





HSGAC Majority : So this map, was it your interpretation of that map that led you to believe that the local snipers would be on top of the roof of the AGR building, or did C/S Team Lead explicitly tell you that they would be on the roof?

19 Witness : I'd have to say it's probably more my 20 understanding of it.

HSGAC Majority: Okay. So C/S Team Lead didn't say that those locals would be on the roof. It was just that was your impression of looking at the icons on the map that he gave you?

Witness : Yes.



HSGAC Majority : Understood. Were you aware of any concerns about line of sight from the AGR building to the stage?

Witness : I was not. I wasn't in a perspective from the AGR building to the view, any type of line-ofsight issues.

7 HSGAC Majority : Were you aware of any efforts to
8 mitigate any line-of-sight issues.

9 Witness : No.

HSGAC Majority : So you mentioned that after the fact you certainly had these concerns about a lack of manpower around the AGR building, but before the rally what was your understanding of who would be responsible for securing the AGR building?

15 It was my understanding, by our Witness : 16 diagrams, was state and local personnel, as well as that **LES** team that was in that building, in that situation. 17 HSGAC Majority : Do you know who decided that? 18 19 Witness . I do not. 20 HSGAC Majority : Was that documented anywhere besides the 21 map that you said C/S Team Lead showed you? 22 : That they were -- that they had Witness 23 individuals around that building? 24 HSGAC Majority : Right. 25 I believe we had a site diagram that : Witness



1 was sent to us in that email. I can't remember what day it 2 was. But there was a diagram that showed posts throughout 3 the event.

HSGAC Majority : And can you talk more about the manpower
that you saw around the AGR building during the event? So
before shots fired, describe the presence of law
enforcement you saw in the AGR area.

8 Witness : So during the event I wasn't 9 necessarily looking at the AGR building, so I couldn't 10 provide that information.

HSGAC Majority: Were you aware of anyone else reporting any concerns about the AGR building before the event?

13 Witness : Before the event started?

14 HSGAC Majority : Right.

15 Witness : No.

HSGAC Majority : So moving forward to the day of the event, what time did you arrive at the Butler site?

Witness : I believe it was around 9:00.
HSGAC Majority That's on Saturday the 13th?
Witness : Yes, sir.

21 HSGAC Majority : And where did you come from? What was

22 your previous assignment?

23 Witness : I was in D.C. for the NATO Summit. 24 HSGAC Majority : Did you drive out to Pittsburgh area 25 that Saturday morning or the Friday night?







1

Did you send that email?

2 Witness : Yes.

HSGAC Majority : So it looks like you wrote, "I have been
rolled twice now." What does it mean to be rolled twice?
Witness : You're on a prior assignment, prior
protection assignment. Like I mentioned, I was at NATO
prior, and then prior to NATO I was in L.A. for another
protection assignment.

9 HSGAC Majority: I see. So as opposed to doing your
 10 regular duties in the Oklahoma City Field Office, "rolled"
 11 means being assigned to a protective assignment.

12 Witness : Correct.

HSGAC Majority : Understood. You also wrote in the email, "Unfortunately, our whole office has been getting it." Again, what does that mean, that the special agents in Oklahoma City had been assigned to protective events?

17 Witness : Correct. Agency-wide.

HSGAC Majority: You stated in the email that you didn't have a raid vest. Why did you not have a raid vest?

Witness : Because our first assignment was plain clothes, and the second assignment was a suit. It was my understanding that I was coming home after that second assignment, so we did not pack a raid vest. It was a mistake on my own.

HSGAC Majority : Why was it a mistake if you didn't need

1 the raid vest for the other assignments? 2 Witness : Because they tell you to plan for the 3 worst, so I should've had it with me. HSGAC Majority : Understood. Did the lack of a raid vest 4 5 at all affect your duties or responsibilities in terms of 6 what you were assigned to do at Butler? 7 : No. Witness 8 HSGAC Majority : Did the lack of a raid vest at all affect your ability to carry out your duties or 9 10 responsibilities? 11 Witness : No. 12 HSGAC Majority: Where were you the night before the 13 rally, so Friday the 12th? 14 Witness : At my hotel. 15 HSGAC Majority : When did you arrive? Do you recall? Witness : I don't recall the time, no. 16 HSGAC Majority : What did you do that night? 17 18 : I probably laid in my hotel bed and Witness went to sleep. I don't remember. 19 20 HSGAC Majority : We're going to pass around this time 21 another email marked Exhibit 3. 22 [Exhibit No. 3 was 23 marked for identification.] 24 HSGAC Majority : This email is from July 13th at 1:32 25 It's marked Bates 2234. p.m.







I said, "Yes." And he said, you know, "Just hang out and if we need you we'll call you on your cellphone."

3 HSGAC Majority: So it was protocol to call you on the 4 cellphone as opposed to a radio?

5 Witness : I just assumed that was what was 6 easiest for them since they were going to be back and forth 7 with the other **LES** teams. It was less voices on that 8 channel.

9 HSGAC Majority: On the Secret Service channel, you mean?
 10 Witness : Correct.

HSGAC Majority: Understood. You said earlier that you were roving. Were you in one particular area for the majority of the time, or more than others?

Witness : So by roving, as CS response and PI, during the lead-up to **LES**, you're relieving other posts that they need to use the bathroom or grab food, or whatever, grab water. So by roving I mean going around to each other's posts and helping them out.

HSGAC Majority: So did you end up just happening to bein any particular area more than any other areas?

21 Witness : It was either at a command post or by 22 the stage.

HSGAC Majority: Or Secret Service Security Room? Is
that what you mean by Command Post?

25 Witness : Yes.




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1 we would not have.

HSGAC Majority : Such as what?
Witness : Arrests, or if there's any type of,
really I guess any local or state law that we can't enforce
necessarily for that area.

6 HSGAC Majority: Did you have any other concerns ahead of 7 the rally that we haven't discussed?

8 Witness : No.

9 I'd like to talk a bit about suspicious HSGAC Majority : 10 person. So generally speaking, what's your understanding 11 of a CS response agent's responsibility when there's a 12 suspicious person in the crowd or otherwise at an event? 13 : So like I mentioned earlier, for CS Witness 14 response, from my understanding, we are not generally the 15 one to respond to a suspicious person. We respond to a 16 threat, which is someone who is obviously posing a direct 17 threat to the event or our protectee. The ones that 18 usually would report to a suspicious person would be PI or 19 CSU.

HSGAC Majority: Before shots were fired, were you aware of a suspicious person in the general area of the 3 o'clock, which is north of the stage, around the AGR building?

24 Witness : About a minute prior to I knew that he 25 was on the AGR building.





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1 I wasn't too alerted by it. I mean, : Witness 2 it's not uncommon for people to have -- I mean, you don't 3 see it every day, but a rangefinder isn't necessarily 4 illegal. However, it is very suspicious, as we know. So I 5 informed my State Trooper counterpart, and we started to 6 look for the individual. 7 Is it common, in your understanding, to HSGAC Maiority 8 see rally attendees with a rangefinder at these types of 9 events? 10 Witness : I don't have prior experience with 11 that, no. 12 Did Special Agent CIUAS Advance give you any HSGAC Maiority 13 information about where the suspicious person was in terms 14 of inside or outside the middle perimeter? 15 Witness : No, not to that effect, that I 16 remember. So did Special Agent C/UASAdvance, for lack of 17 HSGAC Majority 18 a better word, direct you or deploy you to go look for the 19 suspicious person? 20 Witness : He asked me to look for him, yes. 21 HSGAC Majority : So given what you said earlier about 22 your understanding of the role of CS response usually to 23 respond to a threat rather than to look for a suspicious 24 person, were you surprised to be given that assignment or 25 duty?



1 No. Like I said, we help each other Witness : 2 out, so if there's someone that is suspicious we can, if we 3 at the time have no potential threat, we'll look for 4 suspicious individuals. 5 HSGAC Majority : When you had the briefing with 6 C/STeam Lead , did he speak to the role of CS response in terms 7 of what he would expect you to respond to versus not 8 respond to? 9 No. He just said what to respond to, : Witness 10 not what not to respond to. HSGAC Majority : And what did he say that you would be 11 12 responding to. 13 : Threats. Witness 14 HSGAC Majority : Threats. He didn't mention looking for 15 suspicious individuals? : Not that I recall. 16 Witness HSGAC Majority : Okay. In terms of hearing from the CUAS 17 agent, I understand you say you weren't terribly surprised 18 19 to be asked, in general, to respond to a suspicious person, 20 but were you surprised to hear from the lead CUAS agent asking you to do this? Did that seem out of the chain of 21 22 command to you? 23 Witness : Not necessarily, because he was 24 helping in the Security Room, so I kind of figure that he

25 was passed down from the Security Room post-stander, which



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1 was the SAC. I know that the radios get kind of busy so I 2 figured he just passed it over to him, since he was sitting 3 right next to him.

HSGAC Majority : So what was your understanding of what
your task was to do, in terms of looking for the suspicious
person?

- Witness : Just interview him once we found him.
 HSGAC Majority : Interview and to try to determine what
 he was doing?
- 10 Witness : Exactly.

HSGAC Majority: When you were, again for lack of a better word, dispatched or deployed to look for this person, did you notify Officer C/STeam Lead ?

14 Witness : I did not.

15 HSGAC Majority : Why not?

16 Witness : I assumed it was coming from them to 17 the Command Post.

I'm going to hand you another document. 18 HSGAC Majority : 19 This one, I believe, is a text. Marking this Exhibit 4. 20 [Exhibit No. 4 was 21 marked for identification.] 22 So this marked Bates stamped 2239 HSGAC Majority : 23 through -44. This is from Saturday, July 13th. The first 24 text is at 5:52 p.m. Did you receive this text? You can 25 note on the next page, 2240, there's a photograph.



1 Witness Yes. HSGAC Majority : You did receive it. Who sent it? 2 3 Witness C/UAS Advance was the first one to send it to : 4 me. 5 HSGAC Majority : So it was your understanding that this 6 was a picture of the suspicious person you were supposed to 7 be looking for? 8 Witness 2 Yes. 9 HSGAC Majority : Okay. And what did you do in response 10 to receiving this? 11 Witness : I gave it to my State Trooper 12 counterpart, and I texted it to him, as well, and then I 13 encountered PI, the PI agent, and I sent it to her, as 14 well. 15 HSGAC Majority : What was her name? 16 I don't remember offhand, but I Witness Site Protective Intelligence [sic] something or another. 17 believe it was Agent 18 Site Protective Intelligence -- does that sound right? HSGAC Majority 19 Witness : Yes. Thank you. 20 HSGAC Majority : Thank you. And if you turn to page 21 2241, there's an additional text at 5:50 p.m., which 22 appears to have the same photo attached on 2242. And then 23 at 2243 there's another text at 6:04 p.m., and again on 24 2244 it appears to have the same photo. So did you receive



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this photo three different times? Is that what I'm seeing?

1 I don't believe I received it three : Witness 2 I thought I sent it -- it looks like this one was times. sent to Site Protective Intelligence 3 4 I see. So 2241 is where you then sent HSGAC Maiority 5 the photos to others. Is that right? 6 : Let me see here. Witness 7 2241, the From field is redacted, but it HSGAC Majority says, "OK, C." So is it your understand that that's from 8 9 you? 10 Witness : Yep. I believe the second one would 11 be to my State Trooper counterpart, and a third one, 12 because it's a few minutes later, yep, that was to 13 Site Protective Intelligence, out of Phoenix, I quess. 14 HSGAC Majority : Sorry. Is that the PI agent? 15 : Correct. Witness HSGAC Majority: Yeah, understood. Thank you. 16 So can 17 you walk us through what you did to try to locate the 18 suspicious individual? 19 : Yes. So once we got the text of Witness 20 actually what he looked like, my State Trooper counterpart 21 and I got in the golf cart and we started to head up the 22 road towards the Command Post to just try and circle the 23 perimeter, of the inner and middle perimeter. When we got 24 halfway up that road we encountered PI, and I stopped her 25 and asked her if she had the same call as me, and she said



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1 yes, she did. She said that her State Trooper counterpart 2 was already over on the opposite side, so at 3 o'clock, 3 that middle perimeter field, with a couple other local law 4 enforcement and a truck, looking for the individual, and 5 that we should spread out from there, she would go back up 6 towards the Command Post and look up that way, and I would 7 go back down towards the south end, or I don't know if it 8 was the south end, the 6 o'clock of the stage, and look 9 around there.

HSGAC Majority : So backing up, when you began to search for him, was this around 5:52 when you first got this text from Agent CLAS Advance Lread ?

Witness : Yes, it was immediately after.
HSGAC Majority : Do you recall what time you ran into the PI agent?

16 Witness : It was whenever I sent that text, I 17 believe. It was I guess after 6, I guess.

18 HSGAC Majority: And she told you that her counterpart 19 was over by AGR?

20 Witness : He was in that middle field between 21 AGR. AGR wasn't mentioned yet at all.

HSGAC Majority : So at that point did you stick together with Agent Site Protective Intelligence, or did you separate?

24 Witness : No, we separated. She went up towards 25 the Command Post and around that way, heading back towards







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1 PSP Trooper, was in contact with any PSP or other local law 2 enforcement about your search for the suspicious person? 3 Witness : He was. I sent him that picture and 4 he distributed it out to his folks that were there, as 5 So we had more eyes looking. well. б HSGAC Majority: Do you know if he received any 7 information from his PSP colleagues or other local colleagues about further information about the suspicious 8 9 person? 10 : I don't recall him ever mentioning Witness 11 that, no. 12 Were you ever told to stop looking or go HSGAC Majority : 13 back to, you know, your post or roving duties at any point? 14 We were never told to stop looking, : Witness 15 no. 16 HSGAC Majority: Did anything prevent you in any way from 17 looking for him, whether it's the location of the securing 18 perimeter, the fencing, being able to come in and out of 19 secure areas, et cetera? Did anything prevent you or 20 inhibit you from searching wherever you wanted to? 21 Witness : No. I mean, there were other things 22 that happened throughout the event. Like I said, it was a

suspicious person, so for me there were a couple of medical emergencies that happened right in front of me and people kind of grabbed us or asked us for assistance, and I would



have to call EMS real quick and then continue on with the search. There were a couple of fights that we had to break up by the stage. It was a little chaotic all in that last 15, 20 minutes, around the stage area and on the 9 o'clock side, while we were still looking, so that prolonged our search, as well.

7 HSGAC Majority : So let's break this down. You mentioned 8 medical issues. So this is after 5:52, when you had 9 started your search. Is that right?





1 stage?

2 Witness : Yes. A lady got elbowed in the fact, 3 and I guess they were trying to get the closest to the 4 stage, and there was an altercation, and myself and the 5 State Trooper counterpart, what he's there for is to handle 6 this type of issue. So with it being that close to the 7 stage with President Trump coming on, pretty relatively 8 soon that took priority since it was right there. So we 9 removed them from that situation and I guess had one go to 10 one corner and the one go to the other corner, and then we 11 continued on. 12 HSGAC Majority : And again, this was after 5:52. So it 13 was during your search.

14 Witness : Yes.
15 HSGAC Majority : Do you recall how long that took?
16 Witness : I do not.

HSGAC Majority: Do you recall how long it took to
respond to the medical situations?

19 Witness : I do not, no.

20 HSGAC Majority: Okay. So what happened next with your
21 search for the suspicious person?

Witness : So we hadn't had any news of any update whatsoever on him. The last I was told was that he was up towards the far 12 o'clock of the event, so pretty far away, and that was -- I don't remember a time exactly



but it was in between that time. So my focus at this point was to try and get in position for when Trump was coming on the stage, just to be readily available for the CS team in case they saw something while he was coming up on the stage I could respond accordingly. So that's what I started to head towards once the time came closer for him to come up on the stage.

8 HSGAC Majority : I want to address a couple of things you 9 just said. First, did you say that you heard that a 10 suspicious person was at the 12 o'clock?

11 Witness : Yeah. So at the front -- I don't have 12 a map on me, sorry -- but up where the Security Room is I 13 heard that he was pretty much essentially to the right of 14 the Security Room, so your 2 o'clock area, which is why 15 that State Trooper from the PI counterpart was over on that 16 way looking, and that no one had seen him since essentially 17 the first time they saw him. So that's when I started to move myself back to the stage area. 18

HSGAC Majority : And you said you moved yourself back towards the stage area in preparation for the former

21 President to be on the stage?

22 Witness : Correct.

HSGAC Majority : But were you still engaging in the
 search for the suspicious person at that point?

25

Witness : I was being aware. I was keeping my



1 eye out, looking for the individual, because he wasn't 2 wearing what most of the other people were wearing, so I 3 was hoping he would stand out a little bit better. So 4 yeah, I mean, I was still looking, actively looking, as I'm 5 also trying to get into position.

6 HSGAC Majority : So why didn't you go over to the 2 or 3 7 o'clock area if that was where he was reported to be? 8 : We already had people there. Witness 9 **HSGAC Majority**: So was it coordinated in terms of you 10 were told to search a certain area and other people were 11 told to search another area? 12 It was coordinated between myself and : Witness 13 PI, as I mentioned. 14 HSGAC Majority : And you said the PI agent's local

15 counterpart was over in the 2 or 3 o'clock area?

16 Witness : Correct.

17HSGAC Majority: Okay. And you didn't want to duplicate18those efforts. Is that why you didn't go over there?

19 Witness : I thought it unnecessary, yes.

20 HSGAC Majority : Okay. Did you report back to the

21 Security Room at any point about your status at that point?

Witness : I don't recall that I did, no.

23 HSGAC Majority : Are you aware of whether the locals in

24 the 2 or 3 o'clock area found anything?

25 Witness : I'm unaware of it.

HSGAC Majority : And I know you said this was the first time you had worked as a CS response agent, but had you worked protective roles in large outdoor rallies like this before?



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seconds. CUAS Advance gave me a call and said, "There's someone on the building," and that's immediately when I turned around to find out what building.

4 HSGAC Majority : So what exactly did he tell you? 5 : He just said, "There's someone on the Witness 6 AGR building, " and I asked him who. He said it was 7 suspected to be the individual. And then I said, "Okay. 8 We're heading that way." I turned to my State Trooper 9 counterpart, and at the time I was not aware of which 10 building they meant exactly. AGR building, there was two 11 of them over there. So I asked them which one's the AGR 12 building. Since they're locals I figured they would 13 understand more than someone who's from Oklahoma City. And 14 eventually one of the local cops that was standing back 15 there behind the stage pointed it out to us, and at that 16 point that's when the first shot went off, about 10 feet 17 above our head.

I was at the 9 o'clock of the 2 stage, behind the bike rack, trying to discuss with the 3 locals there where the AGR building is, and that's when 4 they pointed to it, and the moment they pointed to it I 5 turned around to start heading that way, and that's when 6 the shot went off.

7 HSGAC Majority: Did you have any understanding from 8 Special Agent CUAS Advance about how the situation was being 9 handled beyond what he told you about what you should be 10 doing?

No.

11 Witness :

HSGAC Majority: So what's your responsibility in that situation? We talked earlier about CS Response being responsible for suspicious individuals versus threats. Were you expected or not at all surprised that you'd be asked to respond to someone on a roof?

- Witness : Yes. I was not at all surprised.
 HSGAC Majority : And you said you associated this with
 the suspicious individual earlier. So in other words, you
 thought it was the person with the rangefinder?
- Witness : Correct.
 HSGAC Majority : And you didn't hear any radio alerts
 about someone on the roof? It was just the call from
 Special Agent CUAS Advance ?
 Witness : Correct.



HSGAC Majority: Did you consider radioing it, that 1 2 information? 3 No. I was more concerned about Witness : 4 finding the threat. 5 HSGAC Majority: Did you ever observe anyone on the roof б before shots were fired? 7 Not before shots fired, no. Witness 8 HSGAC Majority: Did you have a view -- I understand you were asking the locals where AGR was, but once you were 9 10 told where it was did you have a view of the roof from 11 there? 12 Not a clear view, no. Witness : 13 HSGAC Majority: Were you made aware of anyone who was armed? Did Special Agent C/UAS Advance tell you that the 14 15 individual on the roof was armed, or did anyone else tell 16 you that? 17 Witness : I don't recall if he said he was armed 18 or not. I believe he did. 19 HSGAC Majority: Sorry. You said you believe he did tell 20 you that? 21 Witness : Yes, on that phone call. 22 HSGAC Majority : So walks us through again why that 23 wouldn't be radioed? It seems if it's the individual with 24 a rangefinder on the roof and armed, did it not strike you 25 that that should be sent out over the radio for more Secret



1 Service personnel to be notified beyond just a phone call 2 from one person? 3

: I agree. Usually that call would be Witness 4 put out over by Security Room, so I don't understand why it 5 wouldn't have been.

6 HSGAC Majority: Why did it not occur to you to radio it 7 at that point?

8 As I mentioned, I was trying to talk Witness : to the locals about finding where that building was. 9 But yeah, in hindsight, sure, I probably should've radioed it. 10 11 HSGAC Majority : Were you ever aware of any discussion or 12 deliberations about potentially preventing President Trump from taking the stage or from taking him off the stage?

13

Witness : I was unaware of any.

15 HSGAC Majority: Did it occur to you that that might be a 16 proper course of action once you had heard about someone on 17 the roof that was armed, with a rangefinder?

18 : It didn't occur to me at the moment, Witness 19 no.

20 Is it your understanding that the Secret HSGAC Maiority 21 Service has the capability or authority or ability to 22 remove a protectee from a stage if there's a threat?

23 Witness : Yes.

24 HSGAC Majority : And what kind of threat do you think --25 what level of a threat do you think would have to rise to

1 constitute a situation where a protectee should be removed 2 from the stage? 3 : One like this. Witness 4 HSGAC Majority : So then why do you think it was not 5 radioed or why did it not occur to you to suggest that? б I can't speak to why they didn't do it Witness 7 either. 8 HSGAC Majority : So just to be clear, you never saw the suspicious person you were looking for before shots fired? 9 10 Witness : No. 11 HSGAC Majority : Which we now know to be Mr. Crooks. You 12 never saw him before shots were fired? : Not before shots fired, no. 13 Witness 14 HSGAC Majority : So when shots were fired you were still 15 by the stage. Is that right? 16 : Correct. Witness 17 HSGAC Majority: Can you describe what you observed or 18 heard or saw? 19 Witness : So the first shot went off about 5, 10 20 feet above our head. The second shot was obviously 21 immediately right after. I was winged by a piece of 22 shrapnel in the hand, so I started bleeding pretty good. 23 My partner thought that I was shot, but I was not shot. Ιt 24 was just a piece of shrapnel. 25 At that point we started running towards the fence,



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hopped the fence, and ran over to the AGR building and responded accordingly, as fast as we could, to get to the threat.



14HSGAC Majority:Have you since gotten confirmation?15Witness: No.

16 HSGAC Majority : Could you tell the direction that the 17 shots were coming from?

18 Witness : Yes.
19 HSGAC Majority : What was your understanding?
20 Witness : The AGR building. I mean, in that
21 direction, yes, from the AGR building.

22 HSGAC Majority : And how many shots do you recall

23 hearing?

24 Witness : Only two, but after that I was running 25 towards the building, and I was just tunnel vision going to



1 the building. So outside that I wasn't necessarily hearing 2 the shots fired. I was more so just running towards the 3 building.

HSGAC Majority : And what happened next?
Witness : At the building? Is that what you're
asking?

7 HSGAC Majority : Yes.

8 Witness : At the building my State Trooper 9 counterpart and I lifted three TAC gentlemen up on the 10 roof, and then we entered the building to clear the 11 building.

HSGAC Majority: So you didn't get on the roof?
Witness : I did not.

HSGAC Majority: When you were still back by the stage, and I suppose running towards the AGR, do you recall seeing or hearing any local law enforcement fire their weapon?

17 Witness : No.

HSGAC Majority : Did you observe, you know, hear or see the counter snipers, the Secret Service counter snipers fire their weapon?

Witness : I did not.
HSGAC Majority : Have you since learned that local law
enforcement fired their weapon at Mr. Crooks?
Witness : I have heard that, yes.
HSGAC Majority : Have you received any kind of official



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1 confirmation about that?

2 Witness : Only about our sniper, our personal 3 sniper.

4 HSGAC Majority : But not the local? 5 : Not the local. Witness 6 HSGAC Majority : So you said you were injured in the 7 hand. How bad was the injury? 8 : Not bad. Witness 9 HSGAC Majority : It didn't prevent you from responding 10 over to the AGR building? 11 Witness : No. 12 HSGAC Majority : I'm going to hand you a document about This is Exhibit 4 -- 5, thanks, Exhibit 5. 13 that. 14 [Exhibit No. 5 was 15 marked for identification.] 16 HSGAC Majority : So I believe these are texts to and from 17 you from July 13th. The first one is 8:05 p.m. and then 8:23 p.m. So this is Bates 2247 through -49. 18 19 This first text looks like it's from someone in 20 Oklahoma City Field Office to you. I that right? 21 I believe that was to my supervisor, Witness 22 A/ASAC • 23 Sorry. Was it from A/ASAC to you? HSGAC Majority 24 : Sorry. From me to him, I believe. Witness 25 Let me read it.



1 HSGAC Majority : Sure. 2 Oh, so okay. I believe -- honestly, I : Witness 3 don't remember who sent this. I want to say it was either 4 SAIC OKC , our SAIC, or my -- yeah, that would make 5 sense, probably my SAIC. HSGAC Majority : So your Oklahoma City Field Office SAIC 6 7 to you. That's your understanding? 8 I believe so, yes. Witness : 9 HSGAC Majority : So this is talking about the injury that 10 you received to your hand. Is that what he's referring to 11 there, about your injury? 12 Witness : Yes. HSGAC Majority: Can you turn to page 2249? There are 13 14 some redactions on this page. The Secret Service added 15 these redactions. 16 : Yep. Witness HSGAC Majority: Do you know what's under the redactions? 17 So after it says "and it's really nothing" do you recall 18 what you said there? 19 20 Witness : I do not. 21 HSGAC Majority : And when you say "where the shot hit 22 above us," that's referring to the shooter's shots towards 23 the stage where you were still near the stage? 24 : The initial shots, yes. Witness 25 HSGAC Majority : Okay. Do you recall what time you left

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1 the rally site?

2

Witness : After midnight, I believe.

3 HSGAC Majority : After midnight. What were you doing
4 roughly between 6 and 12, you know, shots fired until when
5 you left?

6 So searching that building took about : Witness 7 an hour. After we were done at the building we went to the 8 Command Post. I started helping out wherever they needed 9 help, transported the mother and daughters to the police 10 barracks. That's what that third or last text is about in 11 your exhibit, or sorry, second one, arrived police 12 barracks. I drove them to the police barracks, since they 13 didn't have a vehicle large enough to take all of them in 14 one vehicle, and then came back and gathered up other 15 witnesses at the event. And at that point we really just 16 stood by until -- we were told to stand by until the FBI 17 decided whether they were going to interview us that night 18 or the following morning.

HSGAC Majority: Do you recall hearing any other reports
of a suspicious person that day beside the one?

Witness : No. Just him.

HSGAC Majority: Do you recall hearing any reports about an individual or individuals in a red shirt or yellow shirt?

25 Witness : Okay so yeah, sorry. I thought you



21

1 meant leading up to it. The reason we went into the 2 building would be they said that there were two other 3 individuals, but they didn't say necessarily what they were 4 or whatnot, that were around the building or potentially in 5 the building. We had no idea. Protocol either way 6 would've been to clear that building, because that's where he was, the shooter. But at this point we had no clue 7 8 whether or not there were multiples or not. There was no 9 guarantee.

HSGAC Majority : Sorry. So can you take a step back?
You said you were responding to AGR because of these
individuals. Is that what you said?

Witness
No. I responded to AGR because shots
were fired.

15 HSGAC Majority : Right.

16 Witness : I responded inside of the AGR building 17 because we were informed that there were potentially two 18 other individuals. We had no clue where they were, and 19 from my understanding that's why we went in. But we were 20 going to go in either way since that was the building that 21 the shooter was on.

HSGAC Majority: So what were you told about these individuals?

24 Witness : Just that there were two other 25 individuals. I don't recall if they said they were armed



or not. But they were two other individuals that they felt
 they were with the shooter.

3 HSGAC Majority : And I had mentioned red shirt and yellow
4 shirt. Do you recall hearing that?

5 Witness : I remember red shirt. I don't 6 remember yellow shirt. But I remember red shirt. I don't 7 remember when I heard that, but I do remember a red shirt. 8 HSGAC Majority : Do you recall what ended up happening? 9 Were they located?

Witness : They were, but that was never communicated to us until after we came out of the building. HSGAC Majority : What ended up happening? Were they detained and questioned by local law enforcement?

Witness : I'm unaware of what happened to them.
I just know that they were detained.

HSGAC Majority : But it was no longer a concern to you?
In other words, when did you stop looking for them?
Witness : I didn't until we came out of the
building and heard that they were detained.

20

HSGAC Majority : I see.

Witness : So we searched the entire building. That's why it took an hour, because we had no clue that they were detained pretty much from the beginning of the search.

25

HSGAC Majority :

So when you came out you saw these



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individuals who were detained?



that would be informed of any type of threat, whether it be



"Hey, you know, we have a potential threat. Probably not a good idea to bring the prior President up onto the stage at this time."

HSGAC Majority: And how did that come to be your
understanding? Was there training where you learned this?
Was it communicated to you just on the job, showing how it
works?

8 In training they mention to you that, : Witness you know, the detail lead will -- from my understanding 9 10 they'll do like a threat assessment prior to, or something 11 along the lines. If there's nothing vocalized or 12 communicated then I guess they carry on with the event. HSGAC Majority : 13 Who, to your knowledge, within the Secret 14 Service, has the authority to remove the protectee? 15 Witness : Really any agent there can. 16 And in practice, is there only, among the HSGAC Majority : 17 various types of agents, the specialists, the line agents, 18 you mentioned in your response the detail, who, in 19 practice, is going to physically be in close proximity to

20 the President, and does that ever change?

21 Witness : It's the detail, the direct detail. 22 So there's detail lead and his shift, and that never 23 changes. They're always with him.

HSGAC Majority : So in any instance in which any protectee,
in this case the former President, is potentially going to



1 be removed, is it correct to say that the sole group within 2 the Secret Service that would be the ones to do that 3 removal would be agents in the detail?

Witness : Yes, from my understanding. 5 HSGAC Majority : Have you ever been part of an event where 6 that has happened, where a protectee has either been 7 removed from the public at an event or been held from going 8 out to an event?

10 HSGAC Majority : You also mentioned being injured this day, 11 on the 13th. Have you ever been inured before in your work 12 with the Secret Service?

13 Witness : No.

14 HSGAC Majority : In any of your work prior to July 13th, 15 have you ever, at the NATO event, the California event, or 16 anything when you're in practice in the field, have you 17 ever been a part of an event where threats to the protectee 18 were raised to a level higher than just suspicious

19 activity?

4

20

Witness : No.

21 HSGAC Majority : Any questions before we break? PSI Majority : Sure. Just a few things. This won't 22 23 take long. You mentioned sort of discussing the process of 24 assignments. I think you said they go down the list of 25 agents they need. Is that a list of sort of -- does that



1 include all field offices, do you know?

2 Witness : Yeah, so generally how it works, to 3 give you a better understanding, they put out a 4 solicitation to all field offices that if they need in that 5 area for whatever event, and they'll put a requirement of 6 bodies that they need from that field office. So for 7 example, my office, we're usually so small it's usually one 8 or two agents that they ask for from our office, and then 9 our supervisors submit our name for that event, and then 10 all those names go to a separate database for the site agent or lead who is in charge of that event, so in this 11 12 case the rally, and then they'll have all their post-13 standers listed at that point. And then they just plug and 14 play at that point. There's no rhyme or reason, per se. 15 If people have prior experience in that field and they 16 acknowledge then maybe they'll put them in that field. But 17 even then that's not a guarantee.

18 PSI Majority : Okay. And then you'd mentioned that 19 sort of based off the briefing materials that you got ahead 20 of the event that it was your understanding that there 21 would be local snipers positioned on the AGR building.

22

Witness : Correct.

23 PSI Majority : How, in these briefing materials or in 24 your conversations with Counter Sniper C/S Team Lead, were

25 these buildings labeled?



1

Witness : As in like --

PSI Majority : I'm asking because you said later you were unsure which the AGR building was when you were alerted that there was a threat there. In the briefing materials that you received, how was the AGR building and other buildings identified?

7 Witness : So there is an AGR building which is 8 that one there, and to the left of it there's another AGR 9 building. So I just didn't know if it was the left one or 10 the right one.

PSI Majority : And then regarding sort of the sequence with which you had concerns about the setup and the perimeter that day, earlier you said that you didn't have any concerns until sort of the moment of shots fired. You said, though, that when you arrived there weren't the amount of people that you had expected to be there, sort of for that middle perimeter. Did I get that right?

18 Witness : So near the AGR building. Like I 19 mentioned earlier, I expected the sniper team at that 20 moment to be on the roof. So for there to be an individual 21 on the roof, my concern was how did this individual get 22 there if we had a team on the roof.

23

PSI Majority : Okay.

24 Witness : And I voiced that when I got to the 25 building, to the locals that I did see, not necessarily



nicely. So I just didn't think there was enough presence
 there that you would expect, I guess, if there was that
 potential threat.
 PSI Majority : And you had that thought that there

5 wasn't enough presence. When did that thought occur to 6 you?

7 Witness : As I was running over towards the
8 building.

- 9 **PSI Majority** : Okay.
- 10 Witness : Yeah.

PSI Majority : And then the last thing, you said typically CS Response do not go on post until LES before arrival. That's the arrival of the protectee?

14 Witness : Correct.

15 **PSI Majority**: Okay. Yeah, that's it for me.

16 HSGAC Majority: Okay. We'll go off the record. We'll take

17 a short break and come back in 5-ish minutes.

18 Witness : Okay.

19 [Recess.]

20 Witness Counsel : -- hour or so. We'll ask some 21 questions over on this side here.

My name is HSGAC Majority . I'm with Senator Rand Paul's office. And first of all, thank you for your service. Appreciate what you do.

25 You were in a pretty tough position, limited time as



an agent, first time as a Counter Sniper Response. It was a tough position to be in to begin with. And when you were there, I want to hit on a little bit about your discussions with the counter sniper lead, <u>C/STeamLead</u>. You were given your role at that point, correct? I mean, he told you what he expected from you since, I guess, and you were working for him. Correct?

8

Witness : Correct.

9 HSGAC Majority : Did you feel comfortable with what he 10 had told you, and were you clear on your role and your 11 responsibilities after speaking with him?

12 Witness : Yes, sir.

HSGAC Majority : Did you feel comfortable at any point 13 14 if you saw something maybe that was an alarm to you that 15 you would feel comfortable raising that to someone, if you 16 were given information that may be contrary to what you 17 thought was correct. Being newer in the field, would you 18 feel comfortable pushing back against a seasoned agent? 19 Witness : Regarding a potential threat -- is 20 that what you're asking? 21 Yes, sir. HSGAC Maiority 22 Witness : Yes, I have no problem with that. 23 HSGAC Majority: Okay. Thank you. How many people were 24 at that rally that day? You said it was very large. 25 What's your estimate?


Witness
 : I believe the number was upwards of
 15,000.

3 HSGAC Majority : How many calls of service did you
4 respond to personally?

5 Witness : I lost track after about 20. 6 HSGAC Majority : Who was dispatching you? 7 : So for medical emergencies it was more Witness so, I guess, visual. As far as suspicious individuals that 8 9 was from the Security Room. That's the only communication 10 I got from them. And as far as conflict, that was both the 11 Security Room and other agents, because I had that State 12 Trooper counterpart.

HSGAC Majority : And with the briefing with the counter sniper lead, did he tell you that that would be part of your role, as well?

16 Witness : No. That was only what I did up to 17 the LES . Then I assumed strictly just the role of CS 18 response.

19 HSGAC Majority So all that took place before LES 20 out. And once that took place you just strictly assumed 21 the role of counter sniper response.

Witness : Yes and no. As I mentioned earlier, medical emergencies and conflict near the stage are still a concern and can pose a potential threat, especially the fights. So you still respond within that **ES** as long as,



1 you know, it looks within reason.

HSGAC Majority : How many suspicious person calls did
you specifically respond to?

4 Witness : That was just the only one for that 5 day that I recall.

6 HSGAC Majority : How many suspicious person calls did 7 you hear on the radio?

8 Witness : I don't remember hearing really 9 anything on the radio. The radio for that day, for me at 10 least, was very intermittent. That's why we relied heavily 11 on the cellphone.

HSGAC Majority : But you personally never responded to another suspicious person call, and you're not aware of any others during that day?

15 Witness : Correct.

16 HSGAC Majority : Okay. Did you --

Witness : Other than -- sorry, not to cut you off, sorry -- other than the ones that we mentioned after the AGR, the shooter, and all that. The two other individuals, that was post. But prior to no, no other ones.

HSGAC Majority : Okay. Did you do anything for Lead Was part of your role anything to do with the counter surveillance system at all? Were you put in a position to where if they had to take one down you were to



1 secure it? Anything to do with the counter drone systems?

Witness : So, again, PI and CS, from my understanding, and from the email that we were both sent, you act kind of as a dual hat, multi hat during that time frame. So yes, if there was a UAV issue or drone, we could respond to either the pilot or the drone itself, whoever was called upon.

8 HSGAC Majority : So within LES of the event that role of working, I guess we call it bifurcated role, would 9 10 that cease **LES** in and then you would strictly qo, or 11 what would happen if, let's say, 30 minutes before the 12 protectee took the stage you had a CAUS issue with a 13 threat? How do you choose which one to respond to? 14 Witness : Clarification, I guess, on what the 15 But I personally would have responded to the threat is. 16 threat, and the PI, I would assume, would respond to the 17 UAS.

HSGAC Majority : I guess this is a good time to ask this, because I keep hearing you say suspicious activity and threats.

21

Witness : Correct.

HSGAC Majority : Will you define those for us? What is a suspicious activity, what is a threat, and what differentiates the two, from your training?

Witness : From my training and my understanding,



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1 a suspicious individual is more so someone displaying 2 suspicious -- like, for example, a recent event I went to, 3 from the protection assignment we had, everybody was there 4 for Trump. They were in red, white, and blue, the whole 5 nine yards. But if you have individual show up in all б black, a hoodie, it's 95 degrees outside, it's a little 7 They still want us to interview them. suspicious.

8 And the situation with our shooter, the rangefinder is 9 considered suspicious. It's not a threat. As I mentioned, 10 people will use rangefinders for a variety of reasons. 11 Granted at an event like this it is a little concerning, 12 but it's still suspicious. It's not a threat.

A threat is more so someone who is aggressive in nature or they're carrying a weapon, they're climbing to the top of a building to get a better vantage point, that would be considered to us as a threat.

HSGAC Majority : Correct me if I'm wrong but did you testify earlier that Counter Sniper Lead C/STeam Lead said your specific role was to respond to threats?



25 responsibilities, yes.



1 At what point did the individual now HSGAC Majority 2 known as Mr. Crooks move from suspicious to a threat? 3 Witness : So for me, he was not a threat until I 4 got the phone call that he was on the AGR building, on the 5 roof. б HSGAC Majority : Did you begin looking for him as a suspicious person within an hour of the event? 7 8 : No --Witness 9 Within an hour of Donald Trump taking HSGAC Majority : 10 the stage? 11 I didn't know about him until I think Witness : 12 it was 5:50, 5:51, so it was well within --13 HSGAC Majority : So it was within the hour. 14 Witness : Yes, sorry. Yes. 15 So your role at that point was, if I'm HSGAC Majority 16 not mistaken from your own testimony, was specifically 17 dealing with threats. But you were sent to look for a 18 suspicious person. 19 : Correct. Witness 20 So let's talk about whenever you were HSGAC Maiority 21 sent to look for the suspicious person. You mentioned that 22 while you were doing your search with the counterpart on 23 the golf cart you encountered the PI, and you all made a 24 decision to separate. Am I correct? 25 Witness : To cover more ground, yes.



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HSGAC Majority : What was the rationale in that 1 2 decision, knowing that everything was focused on one area, 3 and there was nothing that we have heard -- maybe you know 4 -- intelligence-wise or radio-wise or any information to 5 suggest that that individual was anywhere else other than 6 the area of the AGR building.

7 That information was not given to me Witness : that he was near the AGR building when we initiated our 8 9 So at the time of our search we had no clue search. 10 necessarily to where exactly he was. We knew he was in the area of the 12 to 3 o'clock, but not near the AGR building. 11 12 There's that big gap between those.

13 HSGAC Majority : Well, yeah, I see what you're talking 14 about. When you're saying 12 to 3 from the dais over 3 15 o'clock, that was the area --

16 : Yes, from all that to the Security Witness 17 Room over, that's where we had his last known. That's why 18 I was heading that way, and that's when I encountered the 19 PI. People walk. People move. So he could've easily went 20 from the 12 to 3 to the 6 to the 9, or wherever it may be. 21 So putting all of our efforts into one localized area, when 22 he's moving, doesn't make sense.

23 In the regard of you have an entire area of 15,000 24 people, if you're looking in one small area and the guy's 25 moving, he's walking, he could easily blend be moving down



1 the side of the fence, or whatever the case may be.

HSGAC Majority : Do you know if anyone radioed out to 2 3 look for the suspicious person? Because if I'm correct, 4 you all had agents, post-standers all over that area that would've been able to be on the lookout for that 5 6 individual, which would have alleviated the fear or issue 7 of concern that you're speaking of, not being able to cover 8 the entire area. But do you know if anyone put that on the 9 radio, all agents, we're looking for fill-in-the-blank. Then you could've, as I said, you would've covered that 10 11 entire area with one radio call. Did you make that call or 12 do you know of anyone that made that call?

Witness : I did not make that call, and like I said, my radio for the duration was very intermittent, so if I missed it I don't know. But I never heard that call. HSGAC Majority : Would you be in a position to, once you got that information from CUASAdvance, to get on your radio and broadcast that so everyone would know that information?

19 Witness : Yes.

HSGAC Majority: Did you make that call on the radio?
Witness: As I stated, no.

HSGAC Majority: Okay. I'm just trying to figure out, because we have agents all over the area, where they're not saturated in one area. And that's what we're trying to figure out if there was a call made to notify everyone



1 collectively so they could all be looking for this 2 individual. 3 You said that you couldn't hear anything about the 3 4 o'clock, what was going on there, because your radio was 5 intermittent. Was it you just couldn't hear, or was the 6 radio cutting in and out? 7 I would go with I just couldn't hear : Witness 8 it. 9 HSGAC Majority : Just couldn't hear it. And you said 10 this was the first large event that you have done. Am I 11 correct? 12 : Yes. Witness HSGAC Majority : Are these earpieces designed and 13 14 created for environments just like the one you were in ? 15 Witness : I can't answer that. HSGAC Majority : My question is just simply because the 16 17 other agents, the shift agents, use the same equipment that 18 you were using. Am I correct? 19 Witness : Correct. 20 HSGAC Majority : Okay. When you were injured did they 21 do an injury report on you? 22 : We did a, I believe it's a CA-1 form. Witness 23 It's like a Workers Comp form, I guess. You have to fill 24 it out if you get injured on the job. That was following 25 the event.



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5 HSGAC Majority : What was your understanding of the 6 roles -- again, I want to hit back on the local snipers. 7 You said that you were given the general diagram with the 8 labels of who is where. And just so we're clear, were you 9 told that the snipers were going to be on the roof, or I 10 think you used the word you "assumed"?

11 Witness : I assumed that they would be on the 12 roof, because they were displayed by a dot on the map, and 13 generally speaking, the best vantage point for that area 14 would be on the roof, just like we had the individuals 15 behind, on the barn. But I don't recall if <u>C/S Team Lead</u> 16 specifically said they would be on the roof, so I can't say 17 he did or did not say that.

HSGAC Majority: But you do remember that for some reason when you saw that roof that was something that you questioned.

21

Witness : Correct.

HSGAC Majority : Okay. I had one more question that I was going to ask you, if I could find it here. I'm bad with sticky notes. I apologize.

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Do you know of anyone else there, besides yourself,





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1 I did, and I texted it to him, as : Witness 2 well. 3 And in PSP Trooper's testimony here it PSI Minority 4 says that, it appears that he's saying that you told him 5 that Mr. Crooks tried to come through the gate with a 6 rangefinder. Did you say that to PSP Trooper ? 7 Witness : That was my understanding at the time, 8 yes. 9 How did you come to that understanding? PSI Minority : Because when C/UAS Advance called he said we 10 Witness 11 had a guy -- I don't remember exactly what he said. My 12 recollection of the conversation on the phone was that we 13 had a guy trying to get to the event with a rangefinder, 14 and my understanding was that he tried to come through the 15 mags with it. I later found out that that's not what he 16 meant by that. He just meant there was a guy with a 17 rangefinder. He didn't necessarily mean inside the event, which would've been good information to know. 18 19 PSI Minority : So C/UAS Advance Lead never told you 20 specifically that Mr. Crooks tried to enter the event with 21 a rangefinder. 22 : No. The wording was more so like we Witness 23 had a quy at the event with a rangefinder. So that, to me, 24 essentially what I thought that meant was he tried to come 25 through the mag. So it was my own interpretation of what



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1 he said.

2 PSI Minority
3 magnetometers at all to you?

4 Witness : Not that I recall.

5 PSI Minority : Okay. Further down on that page --6 again, we're on page 5 -- PSP Trooper goes on to say, "He 7 said somebody took a picture of him because he was looking 8 suspicious, and he said that he tried to come through the 9 gate with a rangefinder, but it was seized."

10 Was it your understanding that a rangefinder was 11 seized?

12 It was, because he also mentioned that : Witness they had -- he said, I believe, that they encountered him 13 14 or something along those lines. So again, my 15 interpretation of it was that they encountered him as he 16 was trying to come through the mags, and they take those 17 type of things. And usually they want us to interview them 18 as a protocol, hey, you know, this is weird. People don't 19 typically bring that kind of thing. Let's interview the 20 guy.

21 So yeah, that was again my interpretation of what I 22 was told.

PSI Minority : But to be clear, C/UAS Advance Lead never told you that a rangefinder was seized. Is that correct?

Correct.

1 **PSIMinority** : On that same page, towards the top 2 again, it's the last sentence of that larger paragraph, 3 PSP Trooper describes, "So we got in the golf cart and started 4 going up. There is a private lane. And then we go up 5 around that, and we end up meeting with another Secret 6 Service agent. I believe she was from Intel, and she said 7 that her, and there were other units already looking for 8 him. And then we can go back to our posts. We went back 9 to where we were, by the bleachers." 10 Is it your understanding that in PSP Trooper's 11 testimony here that he's describing your interaction with 12 Site Protective Intelligence Agent 13 Correct. : Witness PSI Minority : And when you and PSP Trooper met with 14 15 ΡII , can you describe where that meeting occurred? 16 : So like he said, there was a private Witness 17 road that was essentially just for law enforcement and Secret Service transit between the front and the back of 18 19 the event. It happened maybe 50 to 100 yards from the 20 Security Room, on that road. I mean, I don't know whether, 21 landmark --22 PSI Minority : Was she in a golf cart at that point? 23 : Yes. Yep, sorry, yeah. Witness 24 And was she accompanied by anyone? PSI Minority : No. Her counterpart, like I mentioned 25 Witness :

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1 his name offhand. And he also mentioned that he was in 2 that area, as well. 3 PSI Minority : And what was the area? 4 Witness : The right side. So at 12 o'clock, the 5 right side of the event. 6 PSIMinority : And you got a number for a local law 7 enforcement. You don't know who that person was affiliated 8 with or the name of that individual? 9 Witness I don't offhand, no. I can get it, : 10 I'm sure. PSI Minority : Yeah. We would appreciate that. 11 We 12 are hoping to receive your call logs, which will help us 13 understanding the timing of all this. Witness : Yeah. 14 PSI Minority : So you made that phone call 15 16 approximately what time? 17 Witness : It was shortly after the second phone call with C/UAS Advance, so 5:54, 5:55. I'd have to look at the 18 19 call log. It wasn't long after, maybe a couple of minutes, 20 because, like I said, I didn't have much information so I 21 wanted more information on the individual that we were 22 supposed to be looking for. PSI Minority : Right. So before you got in the golf 23 24 cart to drive you received that information of what 25 direction you should go.



Witness

: Yes.

PSI Minority : Okay. And now we can move on to the
moment where you're talking to Site Protective Intelligence Agent and your
understanding of where Mr. Crooks might be at this point in
time.

б Witness : Correct. Oh, so okay. So I talked to 7 her, and I asked her if she's on the lookout for this 8 individual, as well. She said yes. I said, "Were you 9 given the picture?" She said, "Can you send it to me?" so 10 I sent it to her. And then I said, "Where's your counterpart?" She explained that her counterpart and her 11 12 were already looking up in that area, that we want we can 13 go down and look down where we were, and look around there 14 to see if they can find him in the crowd or along the 15 fence, or whatever the case was. So that area was already 16 being, I quess, searched.

17

PSI Minority : The area --

18 Witness : Sorry. The initial area up by the top
19 of the event, the 1 to 3 o'clock.

20 PSI Minority : And what is your understanding of how 21 Site Protective Intelligence knew where Mr. Crooks may be?

Witness : I guess I hadn't -- I guess she just was informed, as well. I didn't ask her how she knew that. At least I don't recall asking her why she knew that or how she knew that.







1 turned around, headed back towards the staging area. On 2 the way down towards the staging area I believe that's when 3 we encountered another medical emergency, a lady or someone 4 passed out, and they called us over. A bunch of people 5 were freaking out. So we ended up getting an EMS over to 6 them, and then a State Trooper who was in the area, as 7 well, we sent him over there to handle that so PSP Trooper and I could move on back down towards the stage and handle the 8 situation down there as far as trying to expand our search 9 10 in that area.

11 PSI Minority : Are you aware of whether Site Protective Intelligence 12 went to AGR, directly to the building? 13 : At what time? Witness 14 **PSI Minority** : Either prior to or after your 15 interaction with her. 16 Witness : Not my understanding, no. I never 17 knew -- she did go to the AGR, is that what you're asking? 18 **PSIMinority** : I'm asking if you're aware of whether 19 she did or not. 20 Witness : No. My understanding is I'm the only 21 one that went to the AGR, and that was after the shooting, 22 for Secret Service-wise. 23 PSI Minority : On the exhibit that we were discussing 24 earlier, the transcript, I want to go to page 7 of 9. 25 Towards the top of that page PSP Trooper says, "right before





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1 And what was discussed? PSI Minority : 2 Witness : The description of the individual, 3 which I already had the picture, but the description, a 4 verbal description. And he just stated that the last time 5 he saw him was in the area I described already, up in the 1 б to 2 to 3 o'clock area of the event, and that was the 7 extent of it. It was a very short phone call. 8 PSI Minority : Did this local tell you where he was positioned at that time of the phone call? 9 10 Witness : Not that I recall, no. 11 **PSI Minority** : Do you know if he was inside the 12 perimeter or outside the perimeter? 13 : I do not. Witness 14 What actions, if any, did you take after PSI Minority : 15 speaking with this local officer? 16 : The actions I did take, after talking Witness 17 to the local officer, was, as I discussed, getting in the 18 golf cart and heading up towards the front of the area 19 where he described, last seen of the individual, when I 20 encountered PI. 21 **PSI Minority** : Was this local officer seeking to 22 confront Crooks as well, at this time? 23 Witness : I'm unaware if he was or not. 24 Do you have any idea why this local PSI Minority 25 officer was aware of the suspicious person who apparently



1 ended up being Crooks? 2 Witness : No. 3 PSI Minority : Approximately how long was this phone 4 call? 5 I can't recall. I know it was short. Witness : That's all. б 7 Before shots are fired, did Trooper PSI Minority PSP Trooper discuss Pennsylvania State Police having a vice 8 9 unit, plainclothes officers outside the security perimeter 10 on that day of July 13th? 11 : Not that I recall. Witness 12 **PSI Minority** : Are you now aware of that? 13 Witness I knew there was when I arrived at the : 14 AGR building, I saw guys in civilian clothes, but I didn't 15 know who they were. I just assumed they were other law 16 enforcement. 17 PSI Minority : Do you know if pspt r spoke to 18 any of his counterparts during this 5:50 to 6:11 time frame 19 on July 13th, and was he able to provide you with any 20 additional details of what Pennsylvania State Police was 21 doing to find Crooks? 22 Witness : No. He just mentioned that they would 23 be on the lookout for him. He sent out the picture that I sent to him to all of his, I quess their group chat, or 24 25 whatever it may be. But otherwise I had no further



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1 into a puzzle, at that point.

2 PSI Minority : Were the doors open when you arrived
3 there?

Witness : No. There were two gentlemen ahead of us, maybe three. I think it was five of us total that went into the building. I could be off by a couple, one or two. But I believe one of them opened the doors.

8 PSI Minority : Was it your understanding that it was 9 locked and then someone opened it with a key, or they just 10 pulled the door open?

11 Witness : I was unaware if it was locked or not. 12 PSI Minority : Did you see the other individual open 13 the door?

14 Witness : I don't recall him opening the door.
15 Not offhand, no.

16 PSI Minority Okay.

17 <u>Witness</u>: This all was happening very, very 18 quick, so no, I can't remember.

PSI Minority : And as you're in the building, we discussed this a little earlier, but again, what were you searching for?

Witness : So in any situation, well, particularly this situation, the last word was that there were two other individuals, but even if there weren't two other individuals you still want to clear the building for







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PSI Minority : You mentioned earlier, I believe, that
 you searched the building for an hour. Is that correct?
 Witness : About an hour, yeah, I believe, 45
 minutes to an hour.

5 PSI Minority
6 entire building?

7 I would say probably about 80 percent : Witness of it. We did break up into teams of two or three, so that 8 9 we could cover more ground faster, which is not uncommon to 10 do, as long as you do it in unison, so you're not having 11 crossfire. So I would say probably about 80 percent, 12 because there were some parts that overlapped, because the building -- I'm not sure if you know the building or not, 13 14 but it's multi levels, multi sections, and there's like 15 cubicle spaces, so a lot of potential hiding spots. 16 **PSI Minority** : And approximately how many people 17 conducted this search with you? 18 Witness : I would say anywhere between 5 and 7. 19 No more than that. 20 And were you always with at least one PSI Minority : 21 other individual --





1 Witness : So it was me and two local TAC guys. 2 I don't know their names. And then later on PSP Trooper 3 and I met back up, throughout the search. He broke off 4 from me at one point and went with the other group, and 5 then we ended up meeting back up again. I don't know the 6 exact time frame of all that. 7 **PSI Minority** : In response to my colleague's question a few moments ago you mentioned noticing plainclothes 8 9 Is that correct? officers. 10 Witness : Correct. 11 Did any of those officers conduct the PSI Minority : 12 search with you? 13 : I don't know. I don't remember. They Witness 14 might have been part of the group that went to the other 15 side. **PSI Minority** : How many plainclothes officers did you 16 17 see? 18 : I saw at least two. I can't remember Witness 19 if there was more, but I know I saw at least two running up 20 to the building. 21 While you were in the building, were PSI Minority 22 you made aware of additional threats? As far as individuals? 23 Witness : 24 Any threats. PSI Minority : 25 It wasn't until after we got out of Witness :

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1 the building and back to the Command Post that we were told 2 that there was a potential for IEDs.

3 **PSI Minority** : At approximately what time? 4 : That timeline I don't remember. It Witness 5 was maybe 15 to 20 minutes after we had finished our search 6 and we were back at the Command Post or Security Room. 7 **PSI Minority** : So it's your recollection that you were not informed of any IEDs or potential IEDs inside the 8 9 building until after you left the building? 10 Witness : Correct. 11 And how did you learn about that? PSI Minority 12 : I do not remember. I mean, there were Witness 13 a lot of people in the Security Room, a lot of people 14 Special Agent saying every which thing. So someone in 15 there mentioned it, and then they said that they found 16 something, I think, under the stage or near the stage or in 17 a van. There were all kinds of things being thrown out at 18 I don't know which one was actually true. that time. Ι 19 still don't know. I think the van one was legitimate, or 20 vehicle, but that's all I remember from that.

21 PSI Minority : And this information that's being 22 shared or discussed, is this through word of mouth? Are 23 you receiving messages communicating these additional 24 threats? Or are there phone calls? Text?

25 Witness : No. From what I heard it was in the



Security Room. I believe they said it over the radio, the radios in the Security Room, and then other people were there saying it as well, that they were investigating the IED. And at one point they said stand by for potential explosion or detonation of a round. But that in the disarmament.

PSI Minority : And what time is that?
Witness : That wasn't long after. I mean, like
I said, it was right after, maybe 15, 20 minutes after we
were done searching the building.

11 PSI Minority : Any additional information regarding 12 what may be disarmed and how it's going to be disarmed and 13 who is going to disarm?

I still don't know.

15 PSI Minority : And where it's going to be disarmed?
16 Witness : No. That was my understanding, was
17 that it was in the event area, but again, everybody was
18 saying everything so I have no idea personally where it was
19 or what they were talking about.

20 PSI Minority : Would it be your expectation, as a law 21 enforcement agent on the ground, to be made aware of 22 certain information regarding locations of potential IEDs 23 or location of potential disarming of an IED.

20 PSI Minority : I want to go to, you mentioned vehicle 21 and potential IEDs. What is your understanding of a 22 vehicle being associated with an IED?




1 an IED?

2 I mean, it's very concerning. Like I Witness : 3 said, I had no clue about any type of potential explosives 4 or anything regarding even that nature. The concern is he 5 meant for that attack to be a heck of a lot bigger than it б Just by hearing that he had that in his possession, was. 7 it sounded to me that he wanted something more to happen 8 than what happened.

9 PSI Minority : When were you made aware that there was
10 a vehicle with IEDs?

Witness : Again, I don't know the exact time frame. It was within that 15, 20 minutes or so after I got done clearing the building that we were told that there was potential IEDs either in the event or nearby.

15 **PSI Minority**: At that moment, were you made aware 16 that those IEDs were associated with a vehicle or that 17 there could be IEDs, generally?

18 Witness : They suspected that there were some 19 with a vehicle and that there were some that they said they 20 found in the AGR building. I don't know if that ever 21 proved true or not. I was never -- again, I was not given 22 that information personally.

23 PSI Minority : You mentioned that you left the site
24 around midnight. Is that correct?

25 Witness : I want to say it was a little after



1 midnight.

PSI Minority : And in the time between you clearing the building, learning about the potential for IEDs, and then you eventually leaving the site, did you receive any additional updates regarding the location of a vehicle that may be associated with IEDs?

7 Witness No. I was in no position to get that 8 information. Usually that's going to be handled by well 9 above my pay grade.

PSI Minority : Sure. I guess in the way that you were hearing about all this other information just by proximity to other people, did you hear any other information regarding a vehicle associated with the shooter and IEDs found in or near the vehicle?

15 Witness : No.

16 PSI Minority : Were you aware of any other federal 17 entities, law enforcement entities, at the event on July 18 13th?

Witness
Witness
Other than HSI, that was all I was
aware of that were there during that time.

21 After shots fired were you made aware PSI Minority : 22 of any other additional federal law enforcement entities? 23 : ATF and FBI showed up later on, yes. Witness 24 When did those officials appear? PSI Minority 25 I can't give you an exact time. Witness : That





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1 I don't recall. I feel like he Witness 2 might've explained something but I really don't remember 3 what he said. I was tasked with three other things at the 4 time, and then they made me a Jump Team Leader of the other 5 group, so it was a lot of tasks all at once. So I don't 6 remember exactly what he said but I did tell him I would go 7 get the supervisor, so he can explain to him what he has 8 going on.









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the perimeter or by that gate on the 3 o'clock side. And at that time frame we also had the medical emergency and then the conflicts. We had two conflicts in that time frame, as well.

5 PSI Minority : What time did you speak with the local
6 officer you phoned?

Witness : I don't remember the time. It was
again after the second phone call with Cluss Advance , so I would
say 5:55-ish, 5:56.

10PSI Minority: Did that local officer tell you that the11suspicious person was inside the security perimeter?

12 Witness : No. He didn't specify what perimeter 13 he was last seen. Not to me, at least.

14 PSI Minority : So all that local officer told you was a 15 description of Crooks.

16 Witness : A description of Crooks and where he 17 was last seen, as far as he was at the front of the event, 18 on the right-hand side.

PSI Minority : So he was outside the perimeter.
Witness : If that's your interpretation of it.
My interpretation was that he was within the perimeter.
I'm saying he was at the front of the event, which is
within the perimeter. We had middle, inner, and outer,
which is a pretty big difference between all three of
those. My understanding was that he was somewhere in



between one of those perimeters, not specifically one
 individual. If you're talking about outside the perimeter,
 that would be outside our outer perimeter, which is beyond
 the AGR building.

5 PSI Minority : So that phone call with the local 6 officer, was it your belief that this local officer had 7 personally seen Crooks in that position that you just 8 described?

9 Witness : Yes. Because ^{C/UAS Advance} explained to me 10 that he was the one that sent ^{C/UAS Advance}, or called ^{C/UAS Advance}, or 11 whatever the case was, that he was the one that saw him. 12 PSI Minority : But to be clear, you and PSP Trooper did not 13 go up to that position.

14 Witness : Correct.

15 PSI Minority : And why not?

16 : As I stated earlier, we did not go Witness 17 that route because our senior agent described that she and many other, and her counterpart, were already in that area 18 19 searching, for us to go down and look in the area of where 20 we were prior to. So I took those orders and carried them 21 out. I went back down towards the staging area and looked 22 around the back side and on the 3 o'clock side.

PSI Minority : So that phone call with the local law enforcement officer that you had, was there any other description that was provided to you? Did he have anything



in his hands at the time? Was he carrying anything? Was there any other description besides -- well, what was the description you were given?

4 Witness : He was saying he had a gray shirt, 5 blonde hair, tan pants, and that was pretty much the extent 6 of it. There was nothing about anything in his hands, other than the rangefinder, but there was nothing else 7 other than the rangefinder, and I was told that by C/UAS Advance. 8 9 PSI Minority : But the local phone call, did they talk 10 about the rangefinder with you?

11 Witness : No, because the purpose of that phone 12 call was to get a description of the individual.

But you already had the photo.

14 Witness : Yeah, but I wanted him to explain to 15 me the description and where he last saw him.

PSI Minority

16 PSI Minority : And which direction was Crooks headed at 17 this point, that the local officer told you?

18 Witness : I don't remember him telling me what 19 direction he was headed in, just where he last saw him.

PSI Minority : After the phone call with the local officer, did you relay any of that information to the counter sniper teams on the barns?

Witness : No. Like I stated, I have not talked to counter sniper teams at all, during the event, and they did not reach out to me about any potential threat or



13

suspicious individual. It was just the Security Room.
PSI Minority : So was there any plan to leave the
security perimeter to look for the suspicious person?
Witness : There was no specific plan to do that,
no.

PSI Minority: I'm just having trouble understanding how
that's possible.

8 Witness : I mean, in hindsight, if we're talking about hindsight, yeah, I would've done a lot of things 9 10 differently, as would anybody else that was there. But 11 looking back at it, we have an outer perimeter for a 12 We have an inner perimeter for a reason. We have reason. 13 a middle perimeter for a reason. Everybody is there to do 14 their job. My understanding was that that area was 15 entirely covered, and then more so once we sent PI and her 16 counterpart there. So at the time I carried out my duties 17 as I was directed.

PSI Minority : So at the time, on July 13th, at that 5:50, 6:00 hour, you meet with Agent Ste Protective Intelligence, at that time your thought is that she is going to handle going over to that direction where you were told by a local law enforcement officer that Crooks was over in that direction, the 1 to 3 o'clock position.

24 Witness : Yes, and I relayed that to her and she 25 had told me she had already known that.



1 PSI Minority : Did you relay on the radio, email, text 2 anything to the rest of your colleagues in the Secret 3 Service that "I had spoken to Site Protective Intelligence and she's going to 4 go out that direction to see if they can find the 5 suspicious person"? 6 : No, I did not. Witness 7 Why not? PSI Minority 8 Witness : Again, hindsight, sure, I could've, 9 but so could she. So could Security Room. They already knew the information. I mean, it was not exactly clear. I 10 11 probably should've, yes. 12 PSI Minority : Do you know if anyone else within the 13 Secret Service, that was outside the perimeter on July 14 13th, who was actually stationed to do security outside the 15 security perimeter, are you aware of --16 : No. Witness PSI Minority : -- any Secret Service people positioned? 17 18 Witness : No. 19 Is that unusual, from your experience PSI Minority 20 working these events? 21 Witness . No. Out of perimeter and beyond is 22 usually handled by state and local. 23 PSI Minority : And outside of the phone call you had with that local law enforcement officer, did you speak with 24 25 any local law enforcement during the day?



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Witness : I mean, other than my State Trooper
counterpart? No. Up until shots fired is when I asked the
individuals behind me, as well as Trooper PSPTrooper, "Hey,
which AGR building is what?" That was the only interaction
I had with other local law enforcement. There was nothing
prior to or anything like that.

7 PSI Minority : And going back to after shots are fired, 8 you go over to the AGR building, you sweep the building, 9 and you're at the Butler Fairgrounds until about midnight. 10 Before you left that night were you aware of how Crooks 11 arrived at the rally?

12 Witness : I was not.

13 PSI Minority: Did you hear anything about his vehicle
14 being located and discovered and searched?

15 Witness : The only thing I heard about the 16 vehicle was that he had potential IED in it. I mean, I 17 assume that meant they searched it. But no, I did not hear 18 anything specifically at all about that.

PSI Minority : Right. So we have Tom Crooks' vehicle.
I think you mentioned the white van, as well.

21 Witness : I don't know what color the van was. 22 PSI Minority : Okay. But there was a van I think you 23 mentioned.

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PSI Minority : Have you heard of that phrase before,
 face sheet?

6 Witness : We have lookouts, or they're called 7 lookouts, or Be On the Lookout, a BOLO.

8 PSI Minority : And these BOLOs are created for each 9 event, or are they specific to just be on the lookout 10 generally?

11 Witness : A little bit of both. Depending on 12 the area and whatnot they'll put out potentials that we've 13 encountered before, PI, Protective Intelligence, cases. So 14 if someone previously made a threat online and they're in 15 that area of, say, in this case a rally, we'll put that 16 lookout, a state lookout or nationwide lookout, whatever it 17 may be, in that email that they'll put out, what whatever the individual's face is or demographics, and then an 18 19 explanation of what exactly their case is.

PSI Minority : So you will sometimes, prior to events or any situation involving a protectee, you will sometimes receive this type of information in an email?

Witness : Correct. Protective Intelligence
Division will put it out.

25

PSI Minority : Did you receive any such information



1 prior to the July 13th Butler rally?

Witness : No. They said there was no adverse -there's a verbiage they use, but essentially there was, from my understanding, no threat.

5 PSI Minority : And if there was some sort of threat 6 then you would expect to receive this additional piece of 7 information that you just described?

8 It doesn't necessarily have to : Yeah. Witness 9 be a threat either. Like I said, it could be somebody who 10 was on the radar for us just for sitting in front of the motorcade on a motorcade route. We'll put that out there 11 12 because there's still a concern that they might do it 13 again. So it doesn't necessarily have to be a threat, as 14 well.

PSI Minority : So just so I understand, information regarding intelligence, adverse intelligence let's just say, it could be the case where there is no adverse intelligence, but you still may receive this information regarding an individual to be on the lookout for?

20

Witness : Correct.

PSI Minority : And again, in the case of the July 13th rally in Butler, you did not receive any information, any be on the lookout information?

24 Witness : Off the top of my head I can't recall. 25 I may or may not have. But I don't recall there being



1 anything.

2 **PSI Minority** : Okay. At this point we'll take another 3 five-minute break and we'll go off the record. Thank you. 4 Witness : Thank you. 5 [Recess.] б HSGAC Majority : Witness Counsel, are you on the line? 7 Witness Counsel Yes, I am. Thank you again for checking. 8 All right. We'll go back on the record. HSGAC Majority 9 Special Agent Witness, thank you very much for your time. 10 My name is **HSGAC Majority** and I work for Chair Peters. I have a few follow-up questions. Thank you again for being 11 12 here today. 13 COURT REPORTER: Excuse me. Can you please move your 14 microphone closer? 15 HSGAC Majority: Can you hear me now? Okay. 16 I'd like to ask a few follow-up questions on your 17 training. You mentioned you graduated from the Academy in September 2023. Is that correct? 18 19 Witness : Yes, ma'am. 20 HSGAC Majority: How was counter sniper response agent 21 covered in your training? Witness : It's a simple PowerPoint presentation. 22 23 They go over it with you. There's no like shooting 24 requirement or nothing like that. It's just a simple 25 academic training.





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1 There's a lot, sorry. There's an Witness : 2 arrival/departure agent, which is where the motorcade pulls 3 in. There's a stairwell agent, which is as it sounds. You 4 stand in a stairwell. There's CSU, which is like a counter 5 surveillance agent. 6 All those you were previously assigned HSGAC Majority 7 as a protective agent? 8 Witness : Yes. 9 HSGAC Majority : Okay. Have you worked as a protective 10 intelligence agent before? I don't recall ever working as a PI, 11 : Witness 12 no. 13 HSGAC Majority : Have you worked as a post-stander 14 before? 15 Witness : Yes. HSGAC Majority : And is it typical for special agent like 16 17 yourself, who recently graduated, new to the position, be assigned to work a protective assignment for the former 18 19 President? 20 It is very likely, and it happens Witness : 21 almost the day you graduate. Some people it happens the day after they graduated. 22 23 Specifically with regard to July 13th, HSGAC Majority 24 you mentioned a counter sniper response agent has a number 25 of duties. Aside from responding to any direction from the

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1 counter snipers in response to a potential threat, what are
2 your other duties?

3 : So up to that time prior to the Witness 4 arrival of the protectee you're simply just helping out all 5 the other post-standers. You're what we call as a relief б agent. You go to all the variety of posts that are 7 throughout the event, ask them if they need a relief to use 8 the head or the bathroom, or grab food or snack real quick. 9 So that's generally what you're doing. The same thing with 10 PI, unless there is something that pops off for PI as far 11 as someone trying to get into the event or whatever cases 12 that it. But for CS response you're simply a relief agent 13 until**LES** out.

HSGAC Majority : From your perspective, both performing the role of protective intelligence agent and a counter sniper response agent, are the roles and responsibilities clear to you --

- 18 Witness : Yes.
- 19 HSGAC Majority : -- at each position?

20 Witness : Yes.

HSGAC Majority: Whose job is it to respond to medical emergencies? You mentioned on July 13th you responded to a number of medical emergencies. Is that because Secret Service and/or state and locals were short staffed, or is it because that is part of your job as a relief agent?



1 Witness : So it's kind of an unwritten ordeal. 2 If there is a medical emergency and you're able to assist 3 in that moment, you're able to assist and carry it out, 4 that's fine as long as it's not keeping you from your other 5 There was no one on either relief at the many duties. 6 medical emergencies I responded to that day. And simply 7 what we're doing, we're not necessarily getting in the crowd and doing CPR on somebody or whatever. We're more so 8 9 trying to contact EMS and giving them a route in to those 10 individuals by separating the crowd and getting them out of 11 the way so that way it's handled efficiently.

HSGAC Majority : And on the morning of July 13th, at the 13 10 a.m. brief, the Secret Service brief you attended, did 14 you receive any documents, any maps? I know the site 15 diagram you received in advance. But did you receive 16 anything on that day so you had a thorough understanding of 17 the lay of the land at the Butler Farm Show?

18 Witness : We had the, I can't remember if it was 19 the night before or the day of, they gave you a packet. Ιt 20 covers all that. It covers how many EOD teams we're going 21 to have, canines, it shows an aerial view of the event 22 area, where certain posts will be positioned at. And that 23 depends on the site agent and how detailed they want to get 24 with that exactly, because you can get very detailed if you 25 want to and break it down to where each local officer is



going to be standing or uniformed vehicle, whatever the
 case may be. But we received one of those as well as the
 CS packet I got from the CS lead.

HSGAC Majority: Did you feel prepared in advance of the
rally that day?

6 Witness : I did. I had all the documents that 7 we typically get for a protection assignment.

8 HSGAC Majority : Did you feel that you had an adequate 9 understanding of the Butler Farm Show grounds and 10 surrounding area?

 Witness : Yes.
 HSGAC Majority Had you worked with Special Agent Cluss Advance Lead
 before?

14Witness<th: No.</th>15HSGAC Majority : Had you worked with Special Agent

16 Site Protective Intelligence before?

17 Witness : No.

18 HSGAC Majority : Did you meet either of them at the brief

19 in advance?

20 Witness : Yes.

HSGAC Majority : I'd like to ask a couple of questions related to communications. You mentioned that you first received information about the suspicious individual with a rangefinder around 5:50 from a call from Special Agent but -- and correct me if I'm wrong -- he did not



provide any context regarding the suspicious individual with the rangefinder other than there was an individual at the rally who had a rangefinder. Is that correct?

- 4
- Witness : Correct.

HSGAC Majority : And at 5:42 p.m., and I'm reading from a 5 6 printout of the Butler ESU PD Ops 4 radio, a Butler ESU 7 commander radios out to the Butler ESU radio, quote, "Jut an FYI. We had a younger white male, long hair, lurking 8 9 around the AGR building. He was viewed with a rangefinder, siting the stage. He was up against the building. I 10 11 believe he was looking up at us, and he walked around the 12 side of the building. We lost sight of him. There was a 13 bike with a large backpack sitting beside it. It's parked 14 in the rear of the building. That wasn't there earlier." 15 Did you receive any of that information?

16

Witness : No, ma'am.

HSGAC Majority: Would that have been helpful to you?
Witness : Extremely helpful.

19 HSGAC Majority : Why?

20 Witness : It gave the exact description of where 21 he was last seen, what he was potentially on a bike, and 22 that he was not just using the rangefinder but looking at 23 law enforcement with the rangefinder. All that brings to 24 light a heck of a lot more concern rather than just 25 somebody that we saw with a rangefinder.



1 HSGAC Majority : Would that have changed your view as 2 something from suspicious to a threat? 3 Witness : I wouldn't say it was exactly a 4 threat, but it's definitely a higher concern for me at that 5 point to find him and immediately go to the AGR building, б if that's where he was last seen. I didn't get that 7 information, like I said, until it was unfortunately too 8 late. 9 HSGAC Majority Understood. And I'm showing you what's 10 been marked as Exhibit 7, Bates stamped 1417. [Exhibit No. 7 was 11 12 marked for identification.] 13 Witness : This is a BOLO email my colleagues 14 referred to. These redactions were applied by Secret 15 Service and DHS. But this is the BOLO email from the 16 counter sniper lead. Let me know when you've had a chance to review the email. 17 18 [Pause.] 19 HSGAC Majority : And just for the record, this email was 20 sent at 5:52 p.m., so 10 minutes after the local PD Ops 21 radio that I just read from. Is this an email you 22 received? 23 Witness : No. It's my first time seeing it. 24 HSGAC Majority : And it reads, quote -- this is an 25 excerpt of it -- "kid learning," which our understanding is



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1 that's an autocorrect from "lurking," "around building. We
2 are in AGR I believe it is. I did see him with a
3 rangefinder looking toward the stage. FYI, if you want to
4 notify SS snipers to look out. I lost sight of him. Also

5 bike with a backpack sitting next to it in the rear of the 6 building that was not seen earlier."

7 So you did not receive this. Correct?

8 Witness : No, ma'am.

9 HSGAC Majority : Would this have been helpful information
 10 for you to have received?

11 Witness : Yes, it would.

HSGAC Majority : Would that have changed the way that you conducted your search for the individual?

Witness : Yes, it would, because we would know the building that he was at and that he was actually near the building, not on the side of where the building, that direction, I guess.

HSGAC Majority : I'll turn it over to my colleagues. 18 19 Witness : I would just like to follow up on a 20 couple of questions my colleague asked, in terms of the 21 training process. Can you tell us if you had any law 22 enforcement experience before you joined the Academy? 23 HSGAC Majority : I did not. I was military for 13 24 years.

Witness : Military. Generally what did you do for



25

1 the military?

2 Witness : Air crewman and water survival 3 instructor.



8 HSGAC Majority: When you joined the Secret Service 9 Academy, what was your understanding of how the development 10 process would play out? In other words, was there a rough 11 number of years you'd have to serve in a Field Office, 12 whether you'd have to serve in the Uniformed Division, 13 before you would be assigned a high-profile protectee 14 event?

Witness : So there was no requirement as far as getting a high protectee. I mean, like I said, there are agents that the day after training were a site agent for POTUS. So, I mean, it doesn't necessarily matter as long as you're qualified, you've got your creds. At that point you are free to use where they see fit. So yeah.

21 HSGAC Majority: When you say POTUS, you mean the current 22 sitting President?

23 Witness :

HSGAC Majority : And when you say site agent, my
understanding is that "site agent" is a specific term that

Yes.



1 one individual is assigned. Do mean that or do you mean 2 just an agent assigned to a particular site?

3 : That's one individual assigned to Witness 4 that. So for example, I was a site agent for JD Vance, so 5 I was in charge of that site that he would visit. You 6 carry out an advance on that site as a site agent, and you 7 have a list of things you need to look for and discuss with whoever is the host of that event. And then you cover all 8 9 your bases -- fire, police, TAC teams, EOD, canine, the 10 whole list.

HSGAC Majority: When did you serve as the site agent for Senator Vance?

13 Witness : It was in, about two weeks after July 14 13th. It was in August, I believe.

HSGAC Majority: So you were coming up on a year out of
the Academy at that point.

17 Witness : Yes.

18 HSGAC Majority : So I guess my understanding is incorrect 19 in that recent graduates have to spend at least some time 20 in a field office doing like financial crime 21 investigations, and then some time at lower level protectee 22 events before they can be even considered being assigned to 23 a high-level protectee event. That's not a correct 24 understanding? It can happen right out of the Academy? 25 Witness Correct. You can get assigned a :



protection assignment for any of them or potential a site
 or a lead as a new agent out of the Academy, yes.

3 HSGAC Majority: And understanding that you're relatively
4 new to the Service, is it your understanding that's a new
5 practice at the Secret Service?

6 Witness : No. I believe it's been a practice 7 for a while.

8 HSGAC Majority : You touched on this earlier, but 9 regarding intelligence I just want to make sure I'm clear. 10 In terms of intelligence, about any adverse intelligence 11 before the event or any kind of threats you were made aware 12 of, you weren't made aware of any threats specific to the 13 Butler event or any adverse intelligence before the event. 14 Is that right?

Witness : Correct. I had nothing.
HSGAC Majority : And the same question regarding to the
protectee. So you weren't aware of any adverse
intelligence or threats to former President Trump before
the event?

Witness : Not to my knowledge, no.
HSGAC Majority : Were you made aware of any intelligence
or threats related to the government of country of Iran?
Witness : Just from like social media and
everything. Not particularly with the job, no. Sorry.
HSGAC Majority : Not through the Service or through DHS?



1 Witness : No. HSGAC Majority : 2 And going back to communications, I just 3 want to make sure again we're clear, do you routinely use 4 your work cellphone at events like this. That's not 5 unusual? 6 : That's not unusual at all. Witness 7 HSGAC Majority : Did you have any issues with cellphone service that day? 8 9 Witness : I did not, no. 10 **HSGAC** Majority: Are you aware of others who did? 11 I am not. Witness : 12 HSGAC Majority : And I think you said earlier you 13 couldn't recall which Secret Service frequency you were on, 14 whether it was **LES** or **LES** 15 No. So to clarify on that, every : Witness 16 event that we have in protection, like I said, I've done 17 over 20 in the last year, we use a different channel most 18 of the times, and generally it's **LES** as post-standers, 19 it's on **LES** But each event sometimes they change it 20 up, so that way you don't have too many people on one 21 channel, or whatever the case may be. 22 If you don't recall the specific HSGAC Majority 23 frequencies, can you recall generally who you were in 24 In other words, was it specific types of contact with? 25 agents that you were on the same frequency as but others



1 were on a different frequency? 2 : Just Secret Service, and so -- sorry. Witness 3 Secret Service and HSI that were at the event were on one 4 channel. CS and the detail, they were on a different 5 channel than what we would be on. HSGAC Majority: So you were on a different channel from 6 7 CS, including Officer C/STeam Lead? 8 Witness : Correct. HSGAC Majority : Did you have a capability to get in 9 touch with them if you needed to? 10 11 Witness : I did. 12 HSGAC Majority : What was that? : I mean, cellphone. That's what he 13 Witness 14 told me to contact him was via cellphone. HSGAC Majority : Okay. How about radio contact with 15 16 state or locals. Did you have any direct contact with them via radio? 17 18 Witness : No. Only through my counterpart. 19 That was it. 20 Okay. You may have just answered my HSGAC Maiority 21 next question, but if you needed to get in contact with 22 state or locals, either to give them information or to 23 request information, what would be the mechanism? Would it be through that trooper that you were partnered with? 24



Witness

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:

For me, yes, but other post-standers,

they wouldn't necessarily have that available to them.
They are not paired with a State Trooper counterpart, if
that makes sense.

HSGAC Majority : Are you aware of anyone else having 4 5 direct line of communications with state or locals? 6 Security Room, and as well, the PI. Witness : 7 We all have direct interaction with state and local. 8 HSGAC Majority : Were there any other difficulties 9 communicating that day? 10 : Just the radio that we discussed Witness 11 earlier, not being able to hear, and then going through the 12 cellphone as a secondary. I'm handing you another document. 13 HSGAC Majority It's 14 marked Exhibit 8. 15 [Exhibit No. 8 was 16 marked for identification.] 17 HSGAC Majority So this is Bates 2235. It's an email from July 13th, at 4:28 p.m. So the email at the top says, 18 19 "All post-standers and Site 2 advance switch radio traffic 20 from [redacted] to [redacted]." 21 Do you recall receiving this email? 22 Witness : Yes. So as I mentioned, multiple 23 channels were used, so if we're stepping on somebody else's 24 motorcade, I believe Mr. Trump's spouse was there as well -25 - not at the event but in close enough range we were



1 catching some of her detail's radio traffic. So they kept 2 trying to switch radio channels to put us on our own, that 3 wouldn't be stepped on, I guess.

HSGAC Majority: So interference or bleed-over from
another Secret Service detail in the approximate
geographical area was causing that problem, is your
understanding?

8

Witness : Correct.

9 HSGAC Majority : So did you switch your radio as
10 requested here?

11 Witness : I did, and I was tasked by Security 12 Room to make sure others did, as well.

HSGAC Majority: I know you said earlier you had trouble hearing, but do you remember experiencing that bleed-over or that interference?

16 Witness : I do not remember offhand. Sorry. 17 **HSGAC** Majority : So again, regarding your experience with 18 the Academy and training, you know, you're kind of in a 19 unique position in that you're a relatively recent graduate 20 of the Academy but also have this incredibly relevant 21 experience with this event. Considering that, what you 22 through in the Academy, the training you received, and then 23 your experience less than a year later at the July 13th 24 event, in your opinion does any of the Secret Service 25 training need to change, that you received at the Academy?



1 Witness I would say yes. Communication, : 2 obviously, is an important factor, a very important factor. 3 And knowing these positions that we stand, like I mentioned 4 earlier, we can potential stand at any position, at any given time. You can be in control of an event that is now 5 6 for POTUS or the next day it's for a relative or a son or 7 daughter of an individual. That footprint varies 8 dramatically between those, as I'm sure you all know, as 9 far as what logistics you need for each of those. 10 So having that kind of training and understanding 11 would better prepare people, as well, when they get out to 12 the field, to handle a situation such as this, I quess. 13 HSGAC Majority : To that point, did you feel prepared, as 14 the site agent for Senator Vance? 15 I did. I'm a bit OCD when it comes to : Witness 16 that stuff, so I was a little overkill, I think, with my 17 event, as I was told from our SAIC. HSGAC Majority : Well, beyond your personal preparations, 18 19 do you feel you received the necessary training from the 20 Service before you were put in that position? 21 . I did. So for me, specifically, at my Witness 22 office, and some other offices may, as well -- I can't 23 attest to those -- they do have prior work-ups for those 24 A lot of sites we reuse, and they've already been sites. advanced prior to, so all you have to do is essentially go 25



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1 back and revisit it, make sure that things are the same, or 2 if they have changed you update the go-bys, and then you 3 discuss with the local law enforcement, fire department, 4 EMS, and everybody. So my office was very good with 5 assisting me with that. 6 And then sometimes you do have a site assist, which 7 comes from like POTUS or in this case Donald Trump, which will be **IES** people that will carry out that site advance. 8 I think we moved to **LES** at this point. 9 10 But I personally, to answer your question, I felt like 11 I was pretty well prepared for mine. 12 HSGAC Majority : And regarding your injury, are you fully healed, back to work? 13 14 Witness : I am. I never was out of work. 15 HSGAC Majority : Other than the medical care, did the 16 Service or DHS perform any evaluation before you were 17 cleared to go back to work? 18 Witness : No. HSGAC Majority: Did you, at any point, get placed on any 19 20 kind of telework status or administrative status or any 21 kind of adverse personnel action after the Butler event? 22 Witness : No. personal 23 24 So they let me stay home with her for two days 25 and then I started advancing that site for Vance.



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HSGAC Majority: At any point that day did you see any drones being flown, whether it was law enforcement or civilian?

4 : No. Witness 5 HSGAC Majority : Have you participated in any afterб action reviews with the Secret Service or DHS? 7 : As in like interviews like this? Witness Is 8 that what you're asking? HSGAC Majority : Yes, whether it's the mission assurance 9 10 investigation or the DHS Independent Panel? 11 Witness : Yes. 12 HSGAC Majority : When were those interviews? 13 : The ISP interview was, I don't Witness 14 remember the dates offhand. It was very shortly after the 15 event. And then the Independent Review Panel, that was --16 I can't remember when that was. I don't remember. It was 17 after that one. So it was the FBI and then the ISP and 18 then the DHS, and the Independent Review Panel. I think it

19 was in August, yeah, for that one.

HSGAC Majority: Is there anything else you think that the Committee should be aware of as we investigate this incident and moving forward, in terms of reforms that we haven't discussed today?

Witness: I mean, as I said, communication. If we can all get ourselves on the same channel, and maybe not



necessarily on the same channel, because obviously that would be too many voices in one spot. But it would be very helpful, as I'm learning today, to have emails that are sent to everybody regarding a potential individual like this, because a father would still be alive and this kid would've been, you know, handled well before he was.

7 But having a universal communication for state, local, 8 and us, whoever the federal entity is there, HSI and Secret 9 Service, a joint email like that would be helpful or some 10 type of unified communication, you know, to relay this kind 11 of information. There's no reason -- this is the first 12 time I'm seeing this stuff, and I was CS Response. That, 13 to me, is very frustrating.

And to be clear, as well, in my case, for the CS folks in that building, clarifying that it was not secure, as we thought it was secure, and to have local and state that are assigned to those positions to relay if they move or if they take a break, or stuff like that, to all of us, as well, would be ideal, so that way we know their movements, as well.

Obviously, further training never hurts, as well.
HSGAC Majority: I appreciate you answering our
questions. I will turn it over to my colleagues.
HSGAC Minority: Again, this is HSGAC Minority with
Senator Paul's office. I would just thank you for your


candor in your last answer. It's the first time we've
 heard that, so I appreciate that.

Let's go back to a little bit of what my colleague, PSI Minority, was hitting on. Back to the moment when you started hearing about this suspicious person, and you received multiple calls, you started looking for this individual, did you sense a growing sense of urgency to find this individual as the minutes went by?

9 So yes and no, and what I mean by that Witness : 10 is many of these events we get suspicious individual calls. At almost every single one I've been to we've had a 11 12 suspicious individual. We interview them and we carry on. 13 That doesn't mean that you get complacent with it, by any 14 means. However, this individual was seen with a 15 rangefinder. He was outside of our immediate area by the 16 stage, which doesn't necessarily mean to stop a search at 17 any means. However, yeah, so I'm --

HSGAC Minority : I guess my point is that when someone continues to be brought up on radio or cellphones or texts, that would probably indicate a sense of, okay, this person really needs to be found. And as time went on, I guess that's what I'm asking you. Did you feel that urgency that we need to prioritize and find this person?

24 Witness : I did. The closer it got to Mr. Trump 25 getting up on the stage, again though, we had no



1 description that he was armed or that he was a threat. You 2 know, at the time, like I said, I was also dealing with the 3 medical emergency and then people fighting. There was a 4 lot going on. It was very much chaos. But yeah.

HSGAC Minority : So when you have multiple issues, as 5 6 you say, chaos, in your training experience are you 7 instructed or trained how to prioritize or triage threats or ongoing situations to deal with the most serious issue 8 9 before moving to the next?

10 Witness : Yes. So in this situation, a 11 suspicious individual that was last seen at the back of the 12 rally was definitely a concern. Yes, I agree. However, 13 with the information that I had at the time, a fight 14 breaking out and individuals having a conflict right next 15 to the stage, directly in the path of where former 16 President Trump was, that took priority at that moment. 17 But immediately once that was resolved, we went back to our 18 search.

HSGAC Minority : So you mentioned a while ago that you 19 20 wanted to know, when you reached out to the local person, a 21 little bit better description of that individual, hear it 22 from them. And one thing you wanted to know was where were 23 they last seen. Why would you want to know where they were 24 last seen?

25

Witness

:

Just so we can direct our efforts in

1 that general aera, at least.

HSGAC Minority : Which leads me to the next question, because you also testified that, you know, you only knew of one or two people going to that area, and that's why yourself -- and we didn't get on the radio to send other people there. Am I correct in that?

7 No. So only the two people that were : Witness our individuals. There was already state and local that 8 9 were stationed along that area, so I guess I should 10 clarify. They went over there with those individuals and 11 were already searching. So it was more than just two 12 people. There was also state and local in that area, as 13 well, within that perimeter. As I mentioned before, middle 14 and outer perimeters are all state and local.

HSGAC Minority : Are you considering the middle
perimeter, between the two fences, where the PSP had their
cars parked, before you get to the other fence that was the
fence to the AGR building?

19 Witness : Correct.

HSGAC Minority: Okay. So inner was within that fence
line, middle is the portion between the two fences --

22 Witness : Mm-hmm.

HSGAC Minority : -- and then outer perimeter was out of that fence line, including the AGR perimeter grounds. Am I correct on that?



1 : Yes. Yes. Witness 2 Okay. What's the purpose of an HSGAC Minority 3 "attempt to locate" on the radio, or a BOLO? 4 : The purpose of it? To find an Witness 5 individual and interview them and remove them as being a potential threat or suspicious individual, get 6 7 clarification on their purpose of being there. 8 HSGAC Minority : Do you know of an "attempt to locate" 9 that was broadcast out to everyone to look for this 10 suspicious person? Witness : I'm unaware of it, no. 11 12 HSGAC Minority : Okay. I've got a couple more questions 13 here. If you would, go back to the Exhibit 6, I think, is 14 the transcribed interview with your counterpart, Trooper PSP Trooper , and got to page 7. 15 16 I'll start with a question. Okay. At any point prior 17 to the shooting were you made aware of a suspicious person being on the roof of the AGR building? 18 19 Let's focus on the statement next, from Trooper 20 "Right before the shots, this is what I started to PSP Trooper get into, right before the shots were fired, Witness 21 came 22 up to me, where we were post, he hits me on the back and 23 says, 'He's on the roof of the AGR.' And then we're like, 24 'Excuse me, he's on the effing roof.' Excuse me, turn, 25 came back around, tell their counterparts that some lady



1 that they talked to, I will pull out a personal phone. He 2 pulled out a map from the Ops plan, and I said, 'This is 3 where the AGR -- this is the AGR building there.'" 4 Is that the discussion you were telling me that you 5 had right before the shots were fired? You didn't know 6 where the AGR building was, what they were talking about? 7 Witness : Yes. How long did that conversation take? 8 HSGAC Minority 9 : Seconds. Witness HSGAC Minority : Estimate. I mean, 5 seconds, 10 10 11 seconds, 15 seconds? 12 I mean, from the time I got the phone : Witness 13 call to the shots fired, in between there it was probably 14 15 seconds maybe. I don't know. 15 HSGAC Minority : Do you know how long it took the shift 16 team to cover former President Trump once the shots were 17 fired? 18 Witness : I do not.

HSGAC Minority : According to the Independent Review, two seconds. So if they can cover him in two seconds when shots were fired, if someone would've got on the radio within 15 seconds, and said, "Shooter on the roof," could we assume that the shift detail would've got him covered within 15 seconds?

25

Witness : I will reiterate, I was on a different



channel than the detail, so therefore that would require me to have to look at my radio and, as well, change the channel. The Security Room that gave me that information could've very well as easily done that --

5

HSGAC Minority : Agree.

б : -- and it would've been done way Witness 7 sooner, and he would've been removed from the stage. So I 8 thought in the moment for me to change my radio and waste 9 time on doing that, we can assess and get on over to the 10 building. Yes, unfortunately, he took his shots when he 11 did. But in a moment's notice I acted the way I felt best. 12 HSGAC Minority : And I don't want you to think that 13 that's pointed only to you, because it seems to be like an 14 issue that, as you said in your providing information, 15 better communications --

16

Witness : Mm-hmm.

HSGAC Minority : -- would certainly be beneficial moving forward.

19

Witness : Absolutely.

HSGAC Minority : And that was the purpose of bringing up that, is that we see a time there that, yes, we keep hearing within seconds, but yet Acting Director Rowe was very proud of the fact that they got him covered within two seconds, which is great. I agree. I don't want it to get lost that we're talking about information passed within







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because an individual with a gun is now elevated to a threat, was it your responsibility to make sure that the counter snipers were aware of that information?

Witness : When I received it from the Security Room, that's usually who it's coming from is the counter sniper team. So if they're reaching out to the Security Room and the Security Room is telling me, that's usually the chain of command on how it goes. They're getting that information from the sniper team to the Security Room to me.

11 **PSI Minority** : So help me understand that a little bit 12 because I believe when we talked, or when you talked to my 13 colleagues earlier your role was to respond to threats, or 14 individuals identified by the counter snipers who were on 15 that roof, right. So they would reach out to you directly 16 and say, "Hey, can you go check this person out?" or would 17 they relay that then to the Security Room and then to you? 18 Ideally they should have -- they could Witness : 19 have done both. They never reached out to me. But yeah, 20 they should've done both.

PSI Minority : So you assumed the counter snipers did relay that to the Security Room. You didn't have any reason to actually believe that that was the case at the time.

25

Witness :

Other than -- no, I guess not, no.



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PSI Minority : Okay. Again, you didn't think to check in with them, right, because we get this at 5:50, and I want to walk back a little bit. Because you get this at 5:50 from Agent CUASAdvance, you get the pictures. You don't think at that point, maybe I should text these pictures over to Agent C/S Team Lead up on the roof.

Witness : Well no, because if I recall, and I
don't know if I stated this earlier or not, they said that
the picture was from the sniper team, through a scope.
PSI Minority : So your belief was that the Secret
Service snipers had taken that picture through the scope.

12 Witness : I don't know which snipers. They just 13 said it was through a sniper scope, so I don't know whose 14 it was. And they didn't give coordinates, like they were 15 supposed to give coordinates as far as where that 16 individual is. That's why they gave me that chart.

PSI Minority : Okay. So you didn't know if it was the Secret Service counter snipers who had taken that picture. So again I ask, does it cross your mind at that point that, hey, maybe I should alert my counter snipers who are up on the barn roof that I'm receiving information that there's an individual being identified here.

23 Witness : In hindsight, yeah, that would've been 24 a good idea.

25

PSI Minority

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Okay. Let's go forward a little again.

You get that phone call. You get the description from the local, right, so you now know it's not one of your counter snipers who is up on the barn roof who has last seen this individual. At that point then does it cross your mind to say, hey, let me give my Secret Service counter snipers a call and give them this update that I just got from the local. Maybe they don't have it yet.

8 : No. Again, the sniper teams are Witness 9 always on the same channel. I mean, that's what they were 10 from my sight. They all communicate on a common ground, 11 whether it be through text, phone call, or radio. So I 12 quess from that understanding, yeah, I just assumed that 13 they had already all known. So yeah, also again, in 14 hindsight, sure, it would've been a good idea to send a 15 text, I quess, of what we found out.

PSI Minority : Did you have the ability only to communicate with Counter Sniper C/STeam Lead, or did you have the ability to communicate with the other three Secret Service counter snipers?

20 Witness : Just C/STeam Lead . He told me he would 21 contact me via cellphone.

PSI Minority : So I know you said your understanding is that the counter snipers are all going to be on their own communication channel, whether it's radio, text message, or some way to communicate with each other. How



1 does that come to be your understanding?

2	Witness : Because he's CS lead, so he handles
3	both the state, local, whoever they're using, as well as
4	his snipers. So he is the lead of the sniper teams. So he
5	coordinates with them, they do the advance together,
б	everything they do is together. So just like all the post-
7	standers are all going to be on one channel, the detail is
8	all on one channel, TAC teams are on one channel.
9	Everybody has their own channel. It's not assumed; it's
10	known, which I am now clarifying.
11	But back to why I kind of, in that case assumed, that
12	they were on the same channel, because TAC teams as well as
13	detail, all of us are on our own channels.
14	PSI Minority : I just want to clarify. When you're
15	saying "channel," are you talking about radio channel?
15 16	saying "channel," are you talking about radio channel? Witness : Yes.

16 17	Witness : Yes. PSI Minority : Right. So I'm talking about the local

1 That's common practice, to give the local TAC teams one of 2 our radios too, to coordinate on the same channel, so that 3 way they can hear both sides of it, their side and, as 4 well, ours. And they can relay information to us, as we 5 relay information to them.

6 PSI Minority : I just want to make sure. Is that the 7 practice that was in place prior to July 13th or post July 8 13th?

9 Witness : My knowledge it's been a practice 10 since I've been on, a very short time.

PSI Minority : Okay. So again, just so we're abundantly clear here, your understanding of that day, how the communications were supposed to work, was that the Secret Service was supposed to exchange radios with the local counter snipers so that they could communicate with the Secret Service counter snipers who were on the roof.

17 Witness : Yes.

18 PSI Minority : Okay. I'm going to turn it over to my
19 colleague.

20 Witness : Okay. 21 PSI Minority : Hey, PSI Minority with Senator Johnson's 22 office. In the position you had in Butler on July 13th, 23 was there any policy that prevented you from leaving the 24 security perimeter?

25

Witness : Not that I'm aware of, no.
