## A BILL

To provide for joint reports by relevant Federal agencies to Congress regarding incidents of terrorism, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Reporting Efficiently
- 5 to Proper Officials in Response to Terrorism Act of 2023"
- 6 or the "REPORT Act".
- 7 SEC. 2. DUTY TO REPORT.
- 8 (a) Requirement.—
- 9 (1) In General.—Whenever an act of ter-
- 10 rorism occurs in the United States, the Secretary of

1	Homeland Security, the Attorney General, the Direc-
2	tor of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and, as
3	appropriate, the head of the National Counterter-
4	rorism Center shall—
5	(A) submit to the appropriate congres-
6	sional committees, by not later than 1 year
7	after the completion of the investigation con-
8	cerning such act by the primary Government
9	agency conducting such investigation, an un-
10	classified report (which may be accompanied by
11	a classified annex) concerning such act; and
12	(B) make the report required under sub-
13	paragraph (A) available on a publicly accessible
14	website.
15	(2) Other reports.—Reports required under
16	this subsection may be combined into a quarterly re-
17	port submitted to Congress.
18	(b) CONTENT OF REPORTS.—A report under this sec-
19	tion shall—
20	(1) include a statement of the facts of the act
21	of terrorism referred to in subsection (a), as known
22	at the time of the report;
23	(2) identify any gaps in homeland or national
24	security that could be addressed to prevent future
25	acts of terrorism; and

(3) include any recommendations for additional
measures that could be taken to improve homeland
or national security, including recommendations re-
lating to potential changes in law enforcement prac-
tices or changes in law, with particular attention to
changes that could help prevent future acts of ter-
rorism.
(e) Exception.—
(1) In General.—If the Secretary of Home-
land Security, the Attorney General, or the Director
of the Federal Bureau of Investigation determines
any information described in subsection (b) required
to be reported in accordance with subsection (a)
could jeopardize an ongoing investigation or prosecu-
tion, the Secretary, Attorney General, or Director,
as the case may be—
(A) may withhold from reporting such in-
formation; and
(B) shall notify the appropriate congres-
sional committees of such determination.
(2) Savings provision.—Withholding of infor-
mation pursuant to a determination under para-
graph (1) shall not affect in any manner the respon-
sibility to submit a report required under subsection

2	section (b) not subject to such determination.
3	(d) Definitions.—In this section:
4	(1) Act of terrorism.—The term "act of ter-
5	rorism" has the meaning given the term in section
6	3077 of title 18, United States Code.
7	(2) Appropriate congressional commit-
8	TEES.—The term "appropriate congressional com-
9	mittees" means—
10	(A) in the House of Representatives—
11	(i) the Committee on Homeland Secu-
12	rity;
13	(ii) the Committee on the Judiciary;

15	(iii) the Permanent Select Committee
16	on Intelligence; and
17	(B) in the Senate—
18	(i) the Committee on Homeland Secu-
19	rity and Governmental Affairs;

22	(iii) the Select Committee on Intel-
23	ligence.
