Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) is a vital component of the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), with the responsibility for identifying, arresting, and removing "aliens who represent a danger to national security or are a risk to public safety." Additionally, ICE personnel enforce a diverse array of federal statutes, to include financial crimes, money laundering, narcotics and weapons trafficking, transnational gang activity, and human trafficking. According to ICE officials, ICE has already recorded 19 incidents of assault on ICE law enforcement personnel for this year through May 22, 2017, compared to only 24 assaults recorded during all of 2016. Given this increase and the potential consequences for the safety of law enforcement personnel at ICE, we write to request that you review the following:

- The number of assaults ICE law enforcement personnel sustained during the course of their duty for each year since fiscal year 2010, including the locations of each assault, the type of assault, days lost to injury, and any trends that have emerged;
- 2) The methods that ICE uses to collect, compile, track, and report data on ICE law enforcement personnel injuries in the field;
- 3) Any measures DHS has taken to improve ICE law enforcement personnel safety in the field, including tactical and de-escalation training;
- 4) Measures that ICE could take to promote law enforcement personnel safety in the future;

- 5) Actions taken against offenders, including how many incidents resulted in prosecution;
- 6) Initiatives, if any, that help provide a safer working environment for ICE law enforcement personnel; and
- Policies that DHS should consider to improve the safety of ICE personnel during the course of their duty.
