14	(b) In General.—Not later than 180 days after the
15	date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Home-
16	land Security shall submit to the appropriate congres-
17	sional committees a Northern Border threat analysis that
18	includes—
19	(1) current and potential terrorism and crimi-
20	nal threats posed by individuals and organized
21	groups seeking—
22	(A) to enter the United States through the
23	Northern Border; or
24	(B) to exploit border vulnerabilities on the
25	Northern Border;

1	(2) improvements needed at and between ports
2	of entry along the Northern Border—
3	(A) to prevent terrorists and instruments
4	of terrorism from entering the United States;
5	and
6	(B) to reduce criminal activity, as meas-
7	ured by the total flow of illegal goods, illicit
8	drugs, and smuggled and trafficked persons
9	moved in either direction across to the North-
10	ern Border;
11	(3) gaps in law, policy, cooperation between
12	State, tribal, and local law enforcement, inter-
13	national agreements, or tribal agreements that
14	hinder effective and efficient border security,
15	counter-terrorism, anti-human smuggling and traf-
16	ficking efforts, and the flow of legitimate trade along
17	the Northern Border; and
18	(4) whether additional U.S. Customs and Bor-
19	der Protection preclearance and preinspection oper-
20	ations at ports of entry along the Northern Border
21	could help prevent terrorists and instruments of ter-
22	ror from entering the United States.
23	(c) Analysis Requirements.—For the threat anal-
24	ysis required under subsection (b), the Secretary of Home-
25	land Security shall consider and examine—

1	(1) technology needs and challenges;
2	(2) personnel needs and challenges;
3	(3) the role of State, tribal, and local law en-
4	forcement in general border security activities;
5	(4) the need for cooperation among Federal,
6	State, tribal, local, and Canadian law enforcement
7	entities relating to border security;
8	(5) the terrain, population density, and climate
9	along the Northern Border; and
10	(6) the needs and challenges of Department of
11	Homeland Security facilities, including the physical
12	approaches to such facilities.
13	(d) Classified Threat Analysis.—To the extent
14	possible, the Secretary of Homeland Security shall submit
15	the threat analysis required under subsection (b) in un-
16	classified form. The Secretary may submit a portion of
17	the threat analysis in classified form if the Secretary de-
18	termines that such form is appropriate for that portion.
