 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
 - 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
 - 4 This Act may be cited as the "PPE Supply Chain
 - 5 Transparency Act of 2020".

SEC. 2. REPORT.

- 2 (a) Definition.—In this section, the terms "per-
- 3 sonal protective equipment" and "PPE" means protective
- 4 clothing, helmets, gloves, face shields, goggles, facemasks,
- 5 and other equipment designed to protect the wearer from
- 6 injury or the spread of infection or illness, as determined
- 7 by the Commissioner of Food and Drugs.
- 8 (b) Report.—Not later than 90 days after the date
- 9 of enactment of this Act, the Administrator of the Federal
- 10 Emergency Management Agency shall, in consultation
- 11 with the Secretary of Health and Human Services, submit
- 12 to the Committee on Homeland Security and Govern-
- 13 mental Affairs of the Senate and the Committee on Home-
- 14 land Security of the House of Representatives, and make
- 15 publicly available, a report examining the security and re-
